“You mustn’t scratch them!” said Mum.

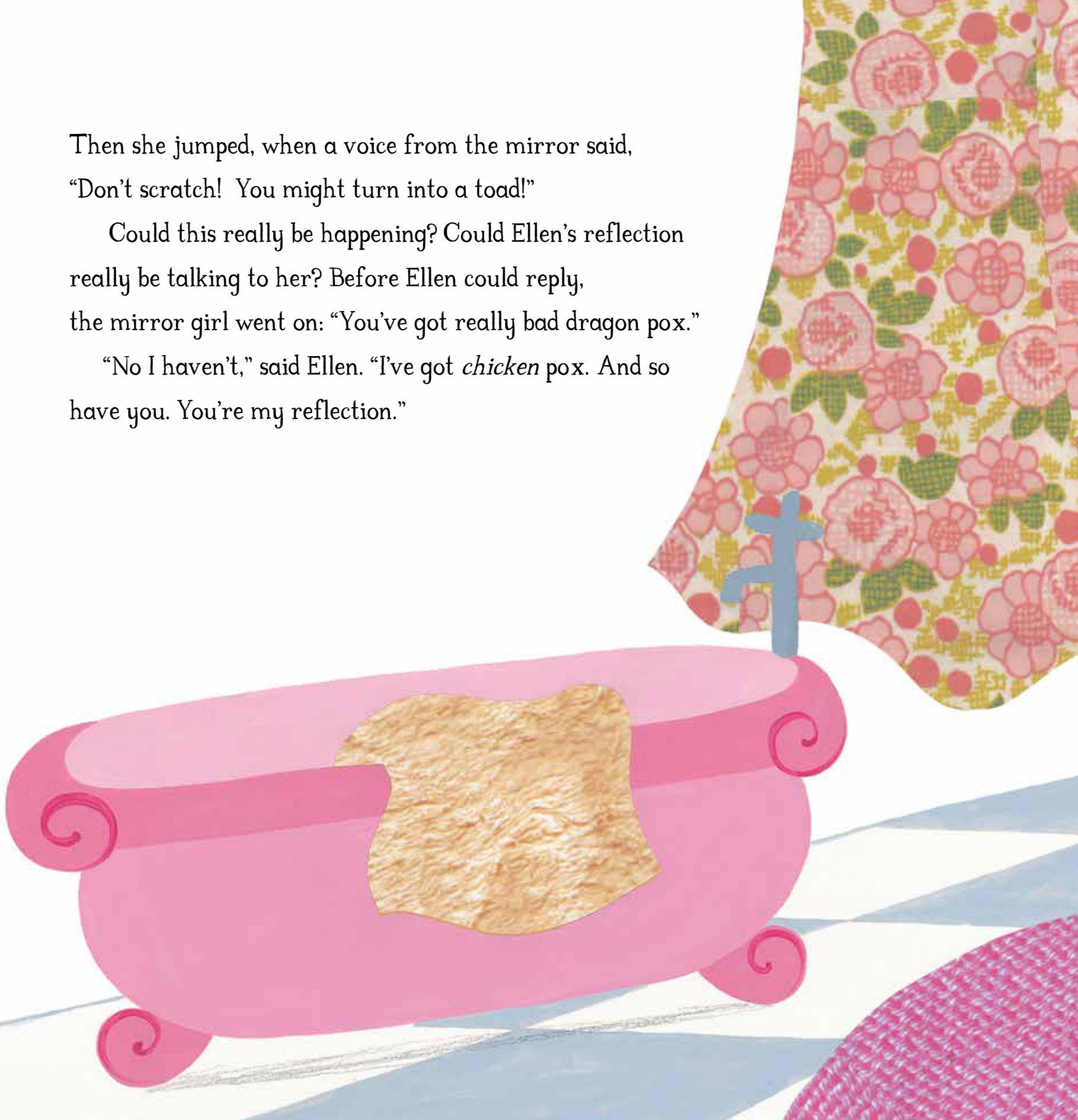
