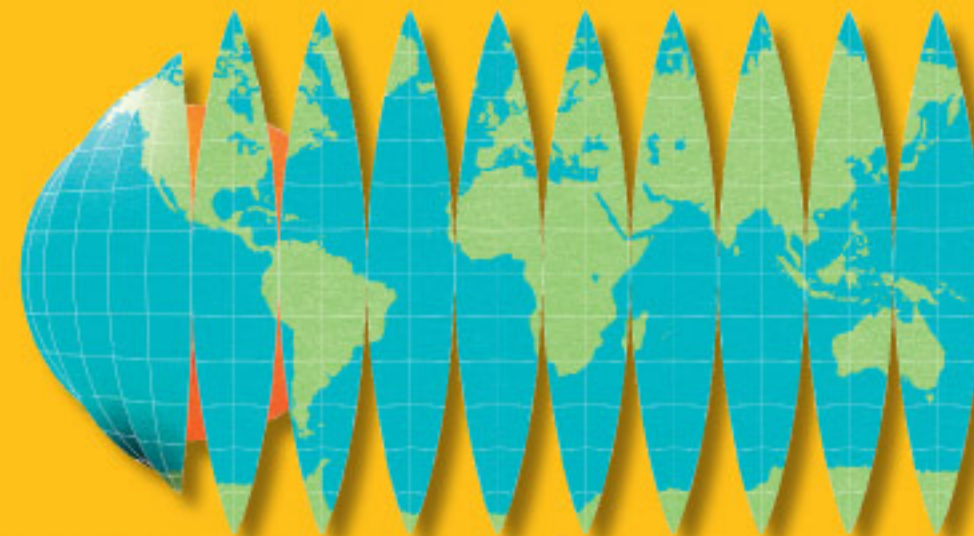

How a world map is made

Each map includes a mini-world map that shows the featured region in colour.

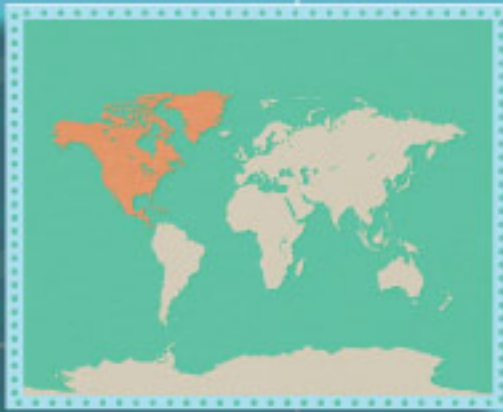


Stickers

NORTH AMERICA

North America stretches from the icy Arctic Ocean in the north to the tropical Caribbean in the south. Mountains run all the way down the western coast, from the snow-capped Rocky Mountains to the rugged peaks and deserts of Mexico. Thick forests cover half of Canada, where winters are cold with deep snow. In the United States, wide plains called prairies sweep eastward from the foot of the Rocky Mountains. Here, farmers grow crops and graze cattle.



Protecting Nature

The world's first national park opened in the United States over 140 years ago to protect the landscape, plants and animals there. There are now over 100 national parks and reserves across North America.

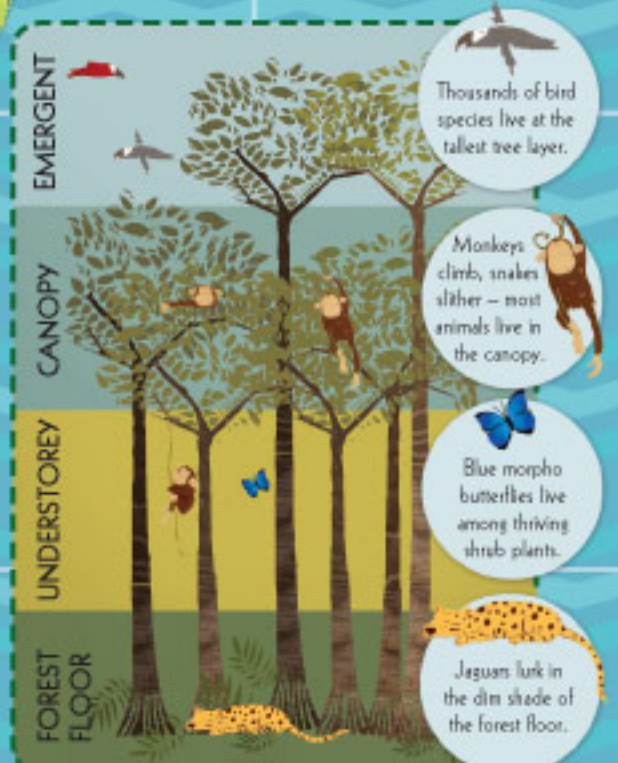
SOUTH AMERICA

Farmers also grow coffee, cotton, bananas and sugar cane. Most people live in busy cities on the coasts.
