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
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DON'T LISTEN TO GEORGIA— YOU'VE BEEN WARNED!

And of course, I'm *really* looking forward to your opinions and anything you'd like to draw. That's why there


are all sorts of fun activity pages up ahead. Trust me, though: Rafe couldn't care less what you think. Seriously. He won't even understand most of it.
