MEDITERRANEAN The Romans and Greeks may have the most famous characters, but there is a whole MIDDLE EAST collection of gods and deities from this region. Following the reign of Zoroastrianism, Persia changed its belief to Islam, but other mythologies including Kurdish, Ossetian and Armenian also sprang to life. INDIA Originating in Northern India, near the mighty river Indus (from where Hinduism takes its name), Hindu mythology has been called the world's oldest belief system. **NORTH AFRICA** North African mythology encompasses Ancient Egypt, the Nubian mythology of Sudan and the ancient Berber culture. which still exists today in countries such as Morocco.

Something out of Nothing

From intelligent design to multiverse theories, from Genesis to Brahma, from Scandinavian fire demons to the Aboriginal Rainbow Serpent, or whatever else you can think of, there are many ideas on how life, the Universe and everything popped into creation.

A God Named Pangu

Many cultures around the world, from Egypt to China, Finland to Polynesia, believe in the cosmic egg creation myth. In China, for example, the myth of Pangu, developed by Taoist monks more than 3,000 years ago, says the Universe began as an egg. A god named Pangu, born inside the egg, broke the shell into two halves: the upper half became the sky, while the lower half became the Earth. As the god grew in size, the sky and the Earth grew too and were separated further. When Pangu died, his body became different parts of the Earth.

King Indian: Brahma

Brahma is the god of creation in Hinduism, a religion practised mainly in India. Brahma has four faces, north, east, south and west, and was brought into being by thought alone, first creating knowledge and then the Universe. He was born in a golden egg and its two halves became Heaven and Earth. When Brahma became lonely he divided himself into two forms, male and female. This division will continue until all life has been created, then the god Shiva will destroy the world, and Brahma will create a new one - and the cycle will continue.

CREATION

Creation myths are the most common forms of myths in the world's cultures. They date back to the earliest times when these cultures first evolved. and thoughts immediately turned to 'Where are we?' and 'How did we get here?" and, most importantly, "Where are we going?"

The Five Types

In mythology, there are, in general, five classifications of creation myths:

Emergence

An origin story that tells how life on Earth has passed V through a series of worlds and transformed over time until reaching where we are now.

Earth Diver

A creature, usually a bird or reptile, is sent to Earth by a 'creator' and life as we know it grows from the aftermath of that animal plunging to Earth, Common in

Native American folklore.

Creation Ex Nihilo (Something out of Nothing)

A Divine Being, such as God, created the whole Universe out of nothing.

World Parent

Where two parents, the sky (male) and earth (female), for example, or light and dark, merge together to breathe life into the Earth.

Cosmogony

The Universe, and everything in it, was created by the splitting of 'Heaven' and 'Earth' into two separate places, or the cracking of a cosmic egg, or a bringing of order from chaos.
