Avoid specifics

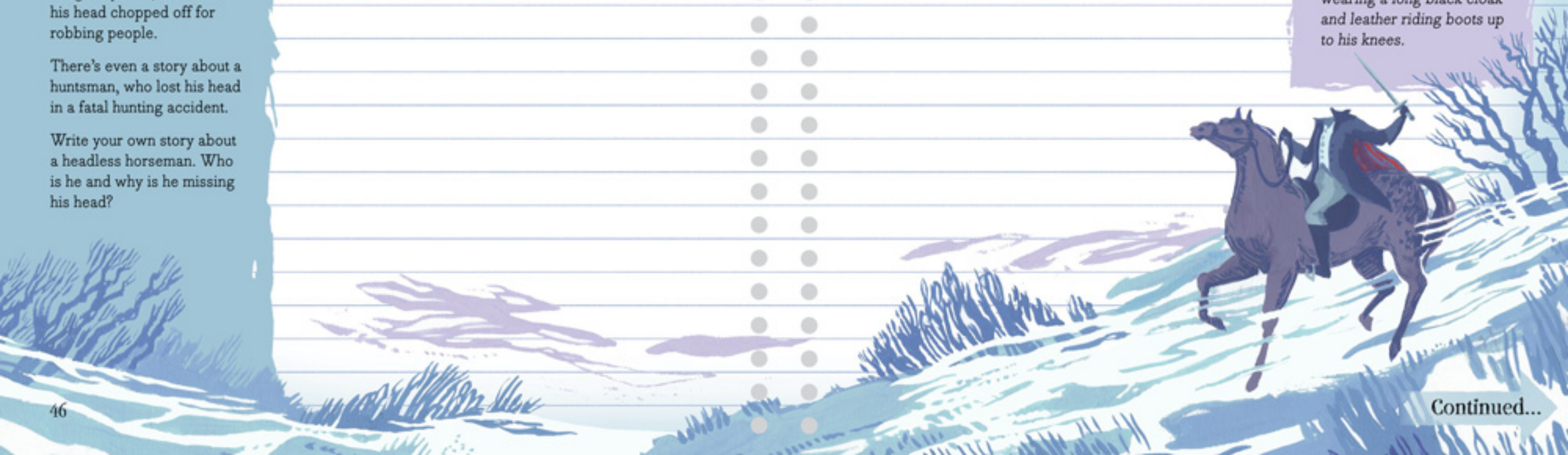
Leaving gaps in your writing can unnerve your reader – a ghost is much more terrifying in your imagination.

Try keeping your descriptions vague and unspecific – perhaps the ghost is surrounded by a mist, or can only be seen from a distance:

The boy heard metal clinking against the ground. Then he saw the outline of a headless figure, riding through the mist.

Rather than:

The boy looked up and saw a headless horseman wearing a long black cloak and leather riding boots up to his knees.
