

Cats and dogs sleep more than us

Dogs sleep for 12 to 14 hours a day, though often in short naps, not one long sleep. Cats can sometimes sleep for up to 20 hours a day.

Chicken

Chicken came originally from the jungles of South East Asia – their ancestor, the Red Jungle Fowl, still lives there. They like to sleep high up on perches, or in trees, where foxes cannot reach them.



Horses

Baby horses – ‘foals’ – spend about half of their day sleeping until they are three months old. They lie down for their naps. As horses grow older, they sleep less and less and very often doze off standing up.



Cows

Cows usually lie down to sleep and can lie down for up to 14 hours a day. Like horses, adult cows sleep for just 3 to 4 hours out of every 24, in naps of between one and five minutes at a time. The rest of the time when they’re lying down they’re just dreaming!

Harvest Mouse

Harvest mice are ‘cathemeral’, meaning they are active day and night, but they are most active in the evening. When a female harvest mouse is going to have babies she climbs up a sturdy corn or grass stalk and weaves a ball-like nest about 10cm in diameter to keep her babies in.



Tortoises

A group of tortoises is called a ‘creep’. Not that you see that very often as they mostly live alone. Their shell is made from the same material as fingernails and hooves. They hibernate in cold weather, meaning they go into a deep sleep for the winter months.
