Chapter 3

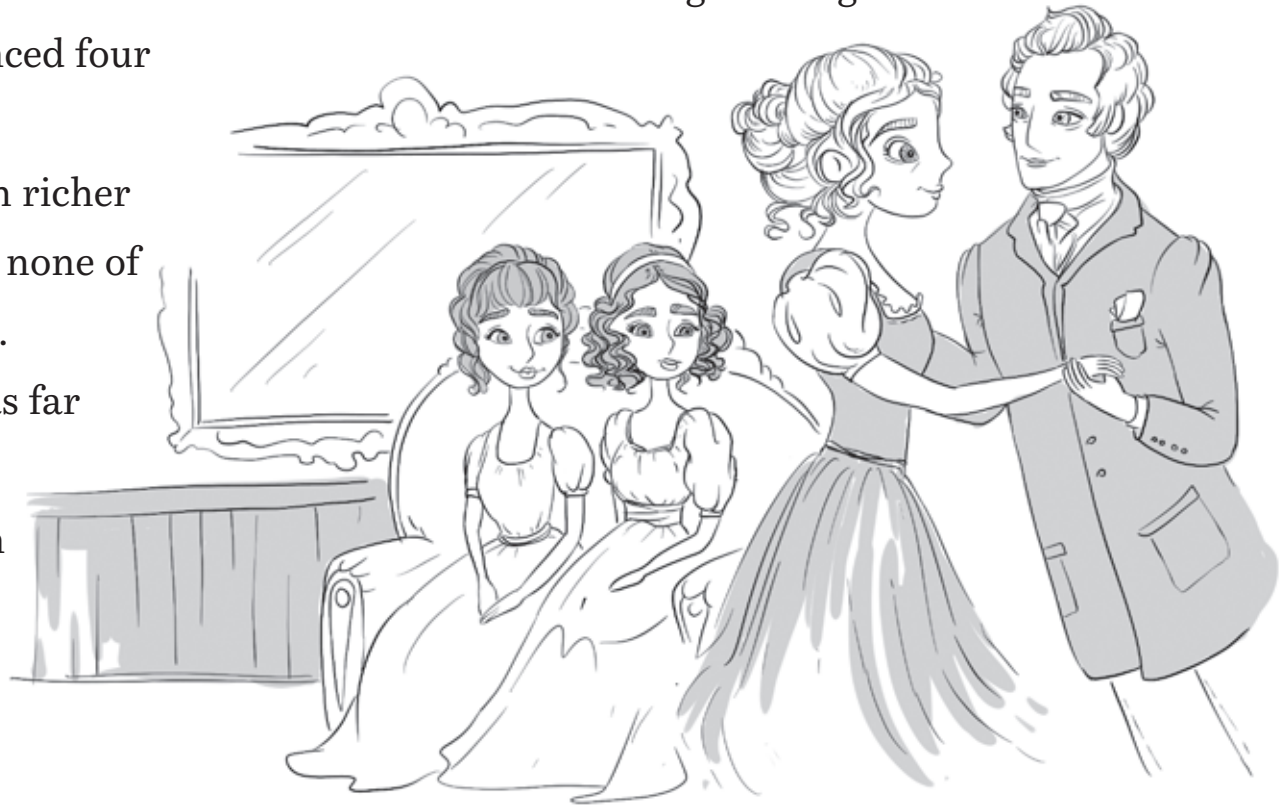
The dance at Meryton confirmed three things to the Bennets:
