ADJECTIVES

Adjectives are words that are used to describe people, objects and places: in most instances, nouns. Adjectives add detail. So rather than, 'the tree', you could say, 'the **tall** tree'. You can combine one, two or even three adjectives. These would be separated by a comma, for example, 'the **tall**, **ancient** tree'.

Superlatives are another useful tool for describing and comparing. Superlatives compare and describe to the greatest degree. For example, the man was not just angry, he was the **angriest** man. This helps us show just how angry he is.
