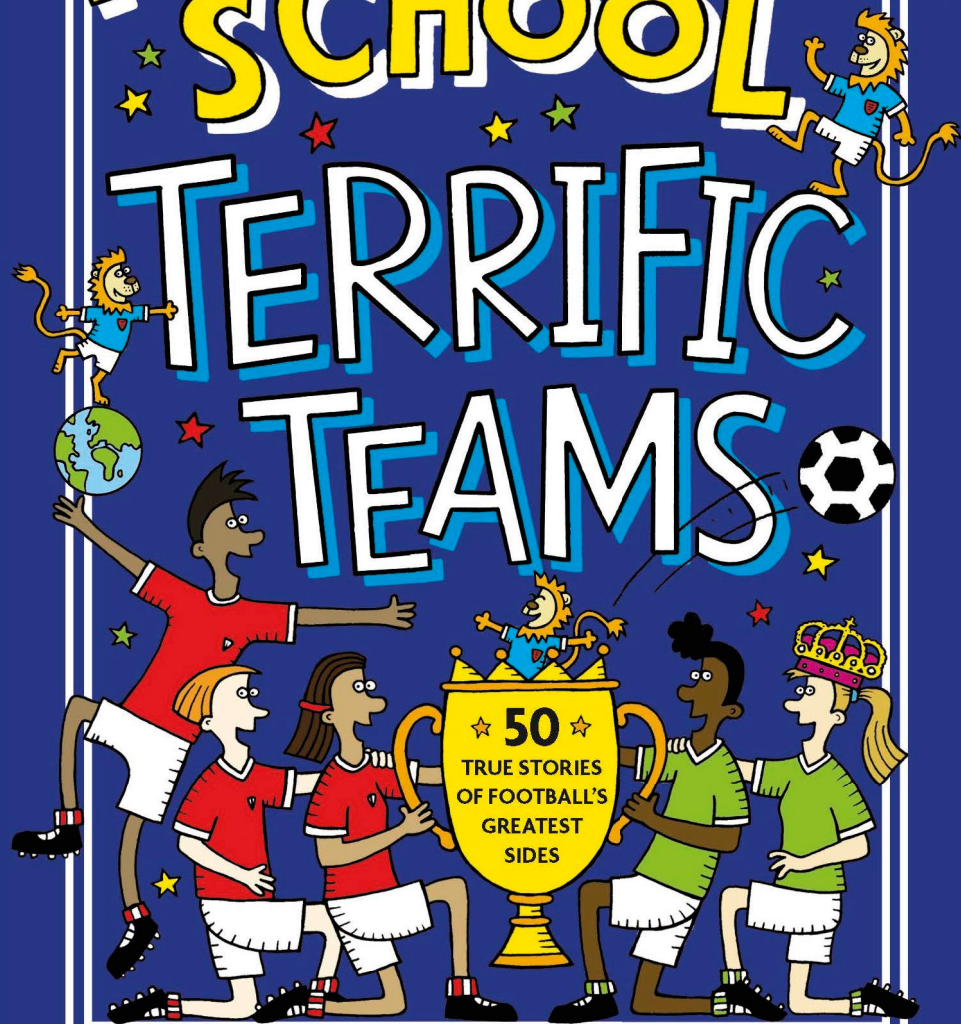

In this book, you will be reading about 50 fabulous football sides, including amateur clubs, Premier League giants and World Cup winners.

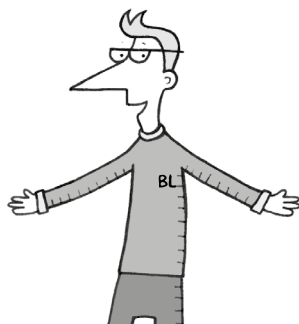
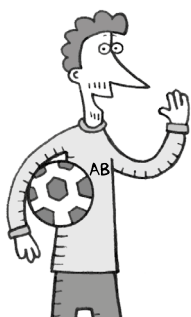
We've chosen men's and women's teams who have written football history ...

Come on, team, let's be serious! Together we can do this.

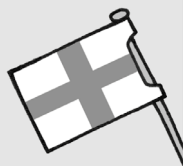

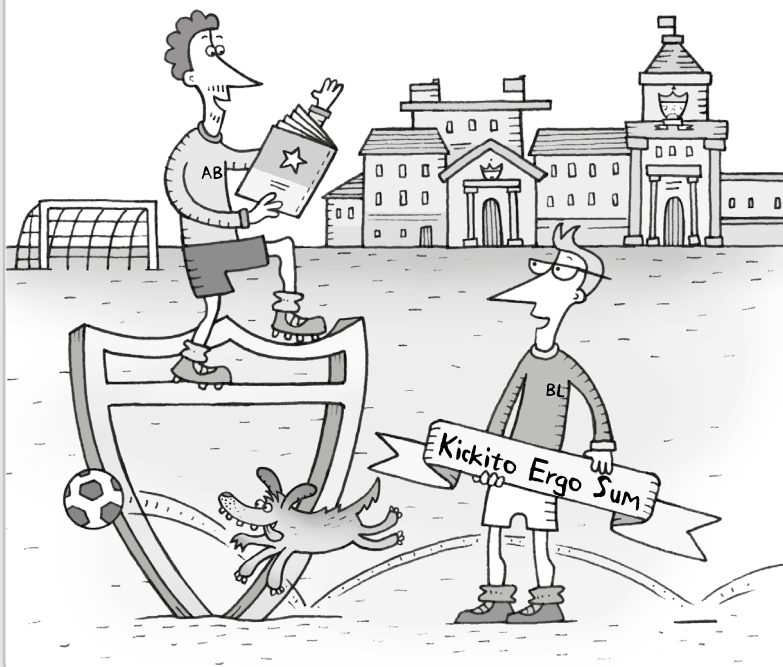

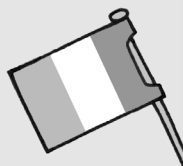


HOME BOYS

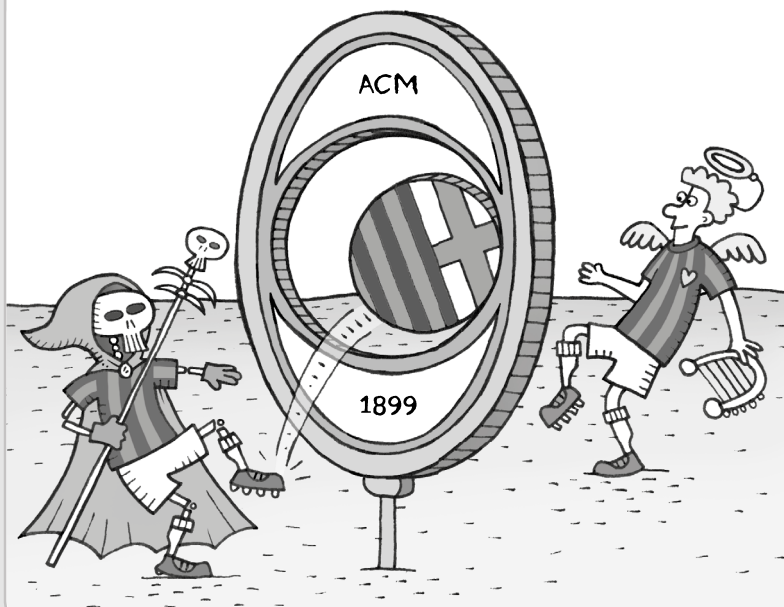


Nickname: *I Rossoneri* (The Red and Blacks)

European giants with an important legacy

AC Milan are Italy's most successful team in European football. They have won the Champions League – or its predecessor, the European Cup – seven times. Only one team, Real Madrid, has won it more. But the influence of the Rossoneri extends far beyond their trophy cabinet. You red (and black) it here first!

When we see players today pressing opponents close to their own goal, defenders starting high up the pitch and using offside traps, this is all down to the influence of AC Milan. Or more precisely, to one man: Arrigo Sacchi. A tactically brilliant coach, he led AC Milan to successive European Cups in 1989 (which included a 6–1 win over Real Madrid) and 1990.

Sacchi was initially mocked when he was appointed, because he had never played the game professionally, unlike most managers at that time. “I never realized that to be a jockey you had to be a horse first,” he replied. Sacchi developed his pioneering tactics after years watching and learning about football, showing that brilliant coaches need not have been top players. “He completely changed how we think about football,” said Jürgen Klopp, another great coach who was not a great footballer.

Milan's last European title came in 2007. These days, they are back on the hunt for the top trophies again, inspired by the goals of Franck Kessié and Zlatan Ibrahimović. The Red and Blacks are red and back!



GIGI IN A HURRY

Goalkeeper Gigi Donnarumma was sixteen when he first played for AC Milan in 2015 and seventeen on his Italy debut. He captained AC Milan for the first time aged twenty-one, playing his two-hundredth game.

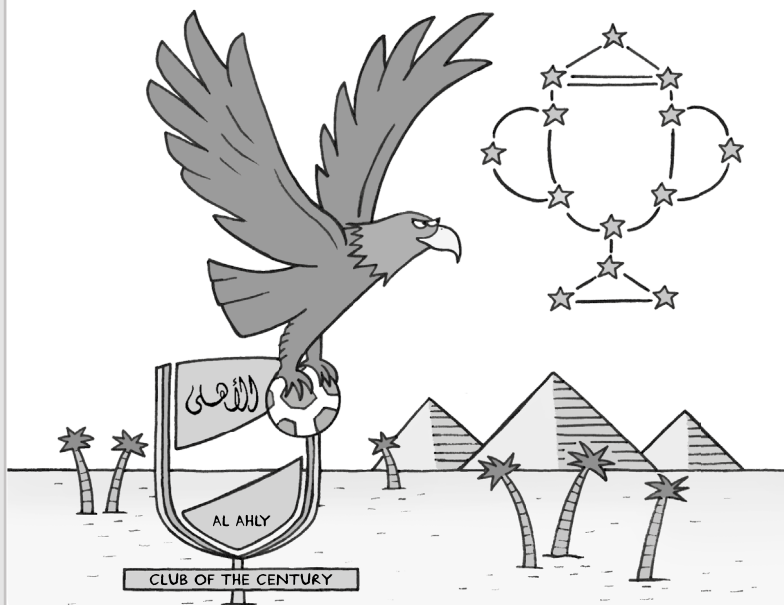


Nickname: The Red Devils

Top Egyptian club overcomes tragedy to win African title

When it comes to trophies, Egyptian side Al Ahly are arguably the most successful in the world, having notched up more league titles, cup titles and continental titles than any other major club. Few clubs, however, have experienced tragedy on the scale that they have. In 2012, rival fans attacked Al Ahly fans during an Egyptian league game, causing a riot that left 72 Al Ahly fans dead. It was the greatest disaster in Egyptian football history. Yet it led to the most improbable – and treasured – of all Al Ahly's victories.

Al Ahly are based in Cairo, the capital of Egypt, and are the oldest football club in the country. They have dominated the national league since it began in 1948: there have been 61 seasons so far, and Al Ahly have won 42 of them!

In February 2012, Al Ahly travelled to play Al Masry, a team from Port Said, in a league game. After the match, Al Masry fans ran onto the pitch and attacked Al Ahly players and the visiting fans with bottles, stones and fireworks. It is thought that the violence had little to do with football rivalry, but instead was orchestrated by the Egyptian government as revenge for the involvement of Al Ahly fans in anti-government protests the year before. During the riot, the teams' players fled to the changing room. Fans were crushed in a stampede as they tried to escape the stadium. One fan died in the arms of Al Ahly captain Mohamed Aboutrika.



NATIONAL HEROES

Al Ahly, which means "The National" in Arabic, had their best season in 2005, winning the Egyptian league, Cup, Super Cup, and African Champions League in an unbeaten 46-game run. Unstoppable!

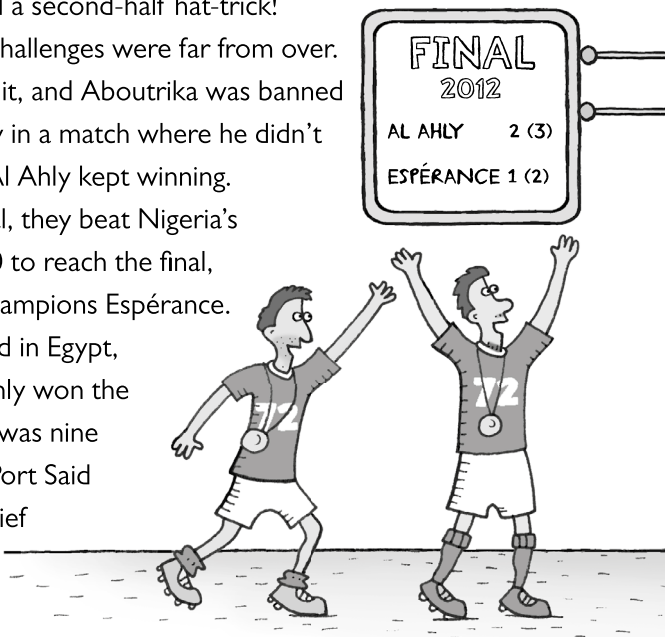
As a result of the tragedy, Egyptian league matches were cancelled. But Al Ahly were also playing in the African Champions League, and they vowed to carry on in the competition. With the trauma and sadness of the tragedy still so fresh, no one expected Al Ahly to be at their best; but the team were desperate to pay tribute to those who had lost their lives.

In the second round, they travelled to Mali and lost 1–0 to Stade Malien. Here again they faced violent scenes, although this time away from the pitch. Straight after the game, a military coup took place – this is when the army seizes power from the government – and there was vicious fighting in the streets. The players were stuck in their hotel for a week as they waited for the chance to get to an airport safely to fly home.

In the second leg against Stade Malien, at home in Cairo, Al Ahly quickly went behind. At half-time, Aboutrika came on. He scored twice to equalize, and then, with two minutes left to play, he volleyed home a glorious winner to send Al Ahly through. The captain had scored a second-half hat-trick!

But the club's challenges were far from over. Al Ahly's coach quit, and Aboutrika was banned for refusing to play in a match where he didn't feel safe. Yet still Al Ahly kept winning.

In the semi-final, they beat Nigeria's Sunshine Stars 1–0 to reach the final, against Tunisian champions Espérance. The first leg, played in Egypt, finished 1–1. Al Ahly won the second leg 2–1. It was nine months after the Port Said tragedy and the grief was still raw.



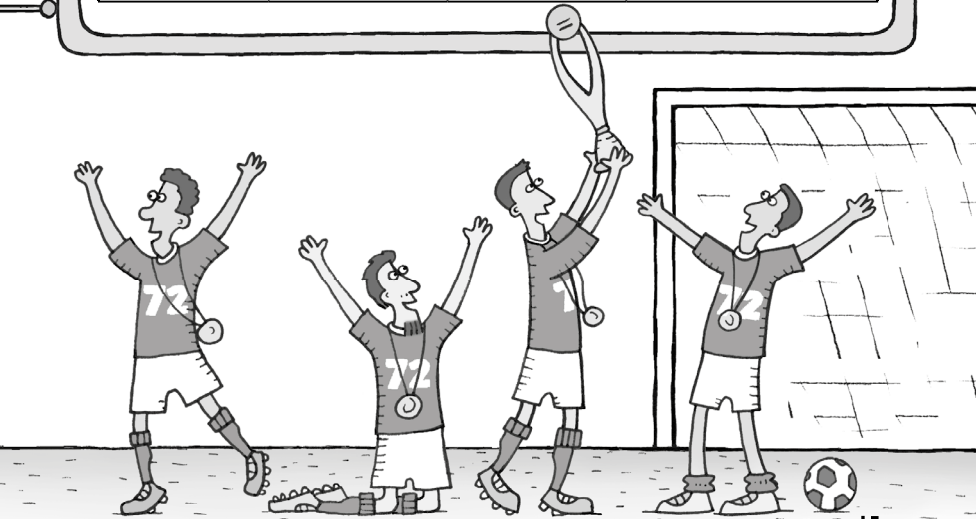

Players celebrated wearing shirts with the number 72 on the front, referring to the number of fans who died.

Aboutrika lifted the trophy with a mixture of joy, sadness and pride: joy at their victory, sadness at the lives so tragically lost and immense pride that his team had fulfilled their pledge to honour those lives against all odds.

Spirited underdogs who never give up

Alcoyano are a semi-professional team from the east of Spain, and are not used to winning big games. In 2021 they caused one of the biggest shocks in Spanish football history when they knocked Real Madrid out of the Spanish Cup. The victory fulfilled the words of an old legend.

There is a well-known phrase used in Spain that goes: *más moral que el Alcoyano*. It translates as “more spirit than Alcoyano” and is used to describe those who have a confidence in winning even if they clearly have no hope. People think it dates back to the 1940s, the last time Alcoyano played in the Spanish first division. That team never gave up!



One story has them begging the referee for a few more minutes at the end of a match against Espanyol because they thought they could win – even though they were 7–1 down at the time. Another story claims that when they were losing 13–0, they still felt they could win. That’s the Alcoyano spirit!

In 2021, in the Spanish Cup third round, Alcoyano faced Real Madrid, a team packed with international superstars, which cost billions to put together. Alcoyano came from behind to win 2–1. Alcoyano coach Vicente Parras was so proud of his players. “You want to know what *más moral que el Alcoyano* is?” he said after the game. “It’s this.”



PANDEMIC PAIN

When Alcoyano beat Real Madrid, the town was struggling with the highest coronavirus infection rate in Spain. This was the positive result everyone needed!

AMERICAN SAMOA

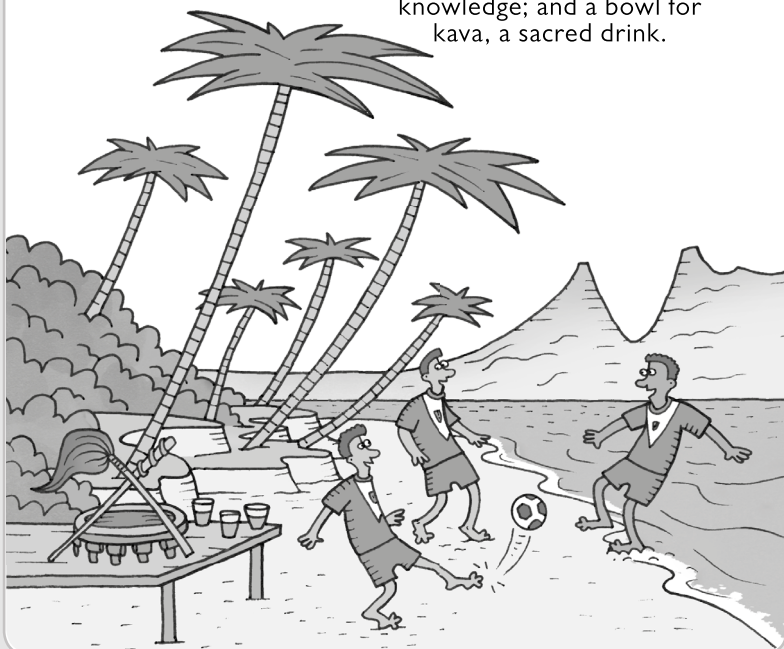


Nickname: The Boys from the Territory

The crest features the three objects on the table, each of which represents an aspect of Samoan culture: a staff used by the islands' chiefs; the mop-like fue, a symbol of knowledge; and a bowl for kava, a sacred drink.

Dignified in defeat, islanders are the pride of the Pacific

Not all terrific teams win trophies – or even matches. Sometimes losing with your head held high makes a team terrific. And when it comes to terrific losses, no one has lost more terrifically than American Samoa.

This tiny nation is made up of six volcanic islands in the southern Pacific Ocean, and is not to be confused with Samoa, another group of islands about 50 miles away. Samoa is an independent nation, but American Samoa is governed by the US. The two Samoas have many cultural links, but they have many differences too, such as separate currencies and they drive on different sides of the road.

American Samoa's national football team became known across the world when they lost their first ever World Cup qualifier by a world-record margin, and then responded with astonishing dignity. The grim score in their historic defeat against Australia was 31–0!

American Samoa were the lowest-placed team in the FIFA rankings when the match was played in 2001. The odds were stacked against them before kick-off. FIFA had ordered that all players must have American passports to travel to the game in Australia, which took place in a stadium near Brisbane. Nineteen players only had Samoan passports, so were not able to play. Many players from the Under-20 team were ruled out because school exams were taking place at the same time.



YOU'RE WELCOME!

The population of American Samoa is 55,000. The area produces more NFL players and US servicemen, per head, than any other US territory.

The American Samoa coach cobbled together a group that included three fifteen-year-olds and had an average age of eighteen. Goalkeeper Nicky Salapu was the only first-team player able to make the game – and it was just as well he did!

They were up against an experienced Australia team that included several players from the Premier League. Salapu made a series of impressive saves to keep it goalless after ten minutes. After Con Boutsianis opened the scoring, the deluge began; by half-time it was 16–0; another fifteen goals followed in the second half. Australia striker Archie Thompson ended up scoring a record thirteen goals in the game. American Samoa had only one shot at goal, when they were already 29 goals down. It was saved.



But when the final whistle blew, one team was definitely happiest. They embraced each other and sang with the fans. Can you guess which team it was? American Samoa! They were pleased they had kept the score down, given the players they had, and were grateful to their man-of-the-match, Salapu, who had made over 20 important saves.

But the game haunted him. Fans often reminded him of it and bullies teased his son about the scoreline. Salapu replayed

the fixture on the FIFA video game, playing as American Samoa and his son as Australia. To try to get over the defeat, he froze his son's controller (with his permission!) and did not stop playing until American Samoa were winning 50–0.

The impact of the match was long-lasting: FIFA changed their qualifying system so that weaker teams like American Samoa played against opposition of a similar standard in preliminary rounds, to allow them more competitive matches. It meant American Samoa were able to slowly improve and move up the FIFA rankings.

Ten years later, Salapu finally put the loss behind him, when he was part of the American Samoa team that won their first ever match. After a run of 30 successive defeats, American Samoa beat Tonga 2–1 in a World Cup qualifier. Salapu, the only survivor of the 31–0 loss to play, cried tears of joy. He declared, "I'm going to put the past behind me . . . I'm a free man!" After a long, long wait, American Samoa had won at last.

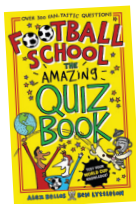
