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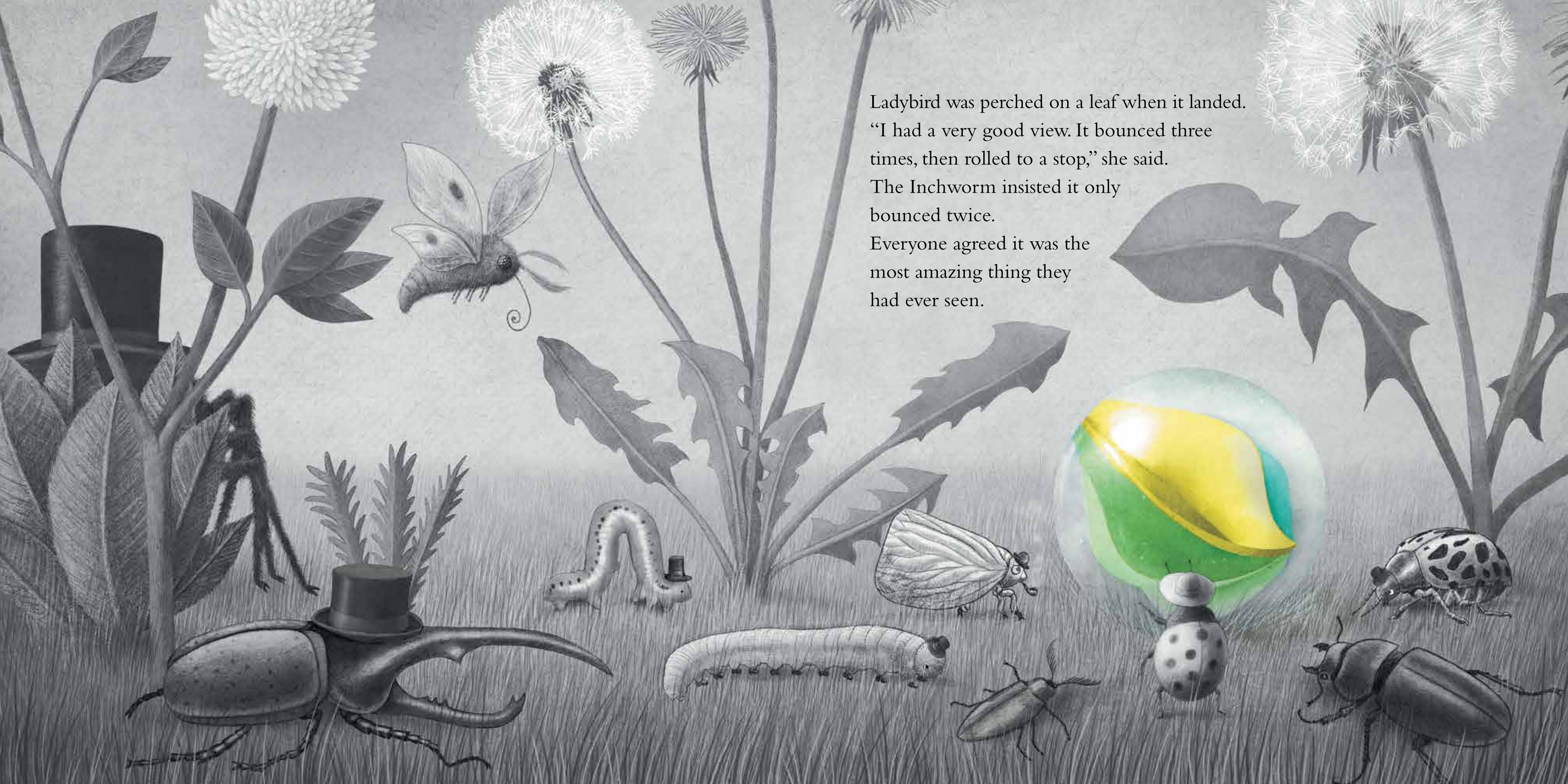

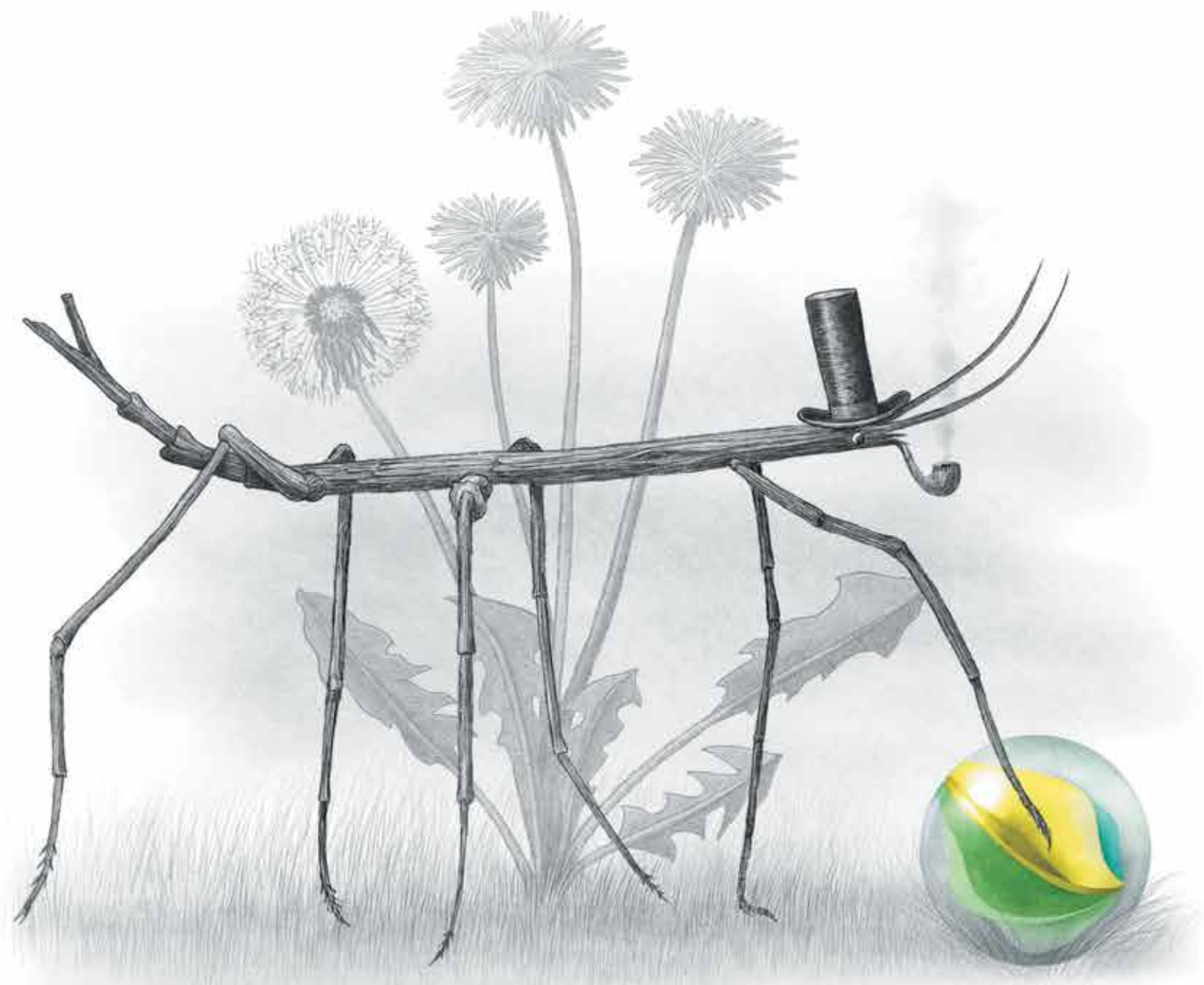
Frances Lincoln

He didn't like how it tasted.

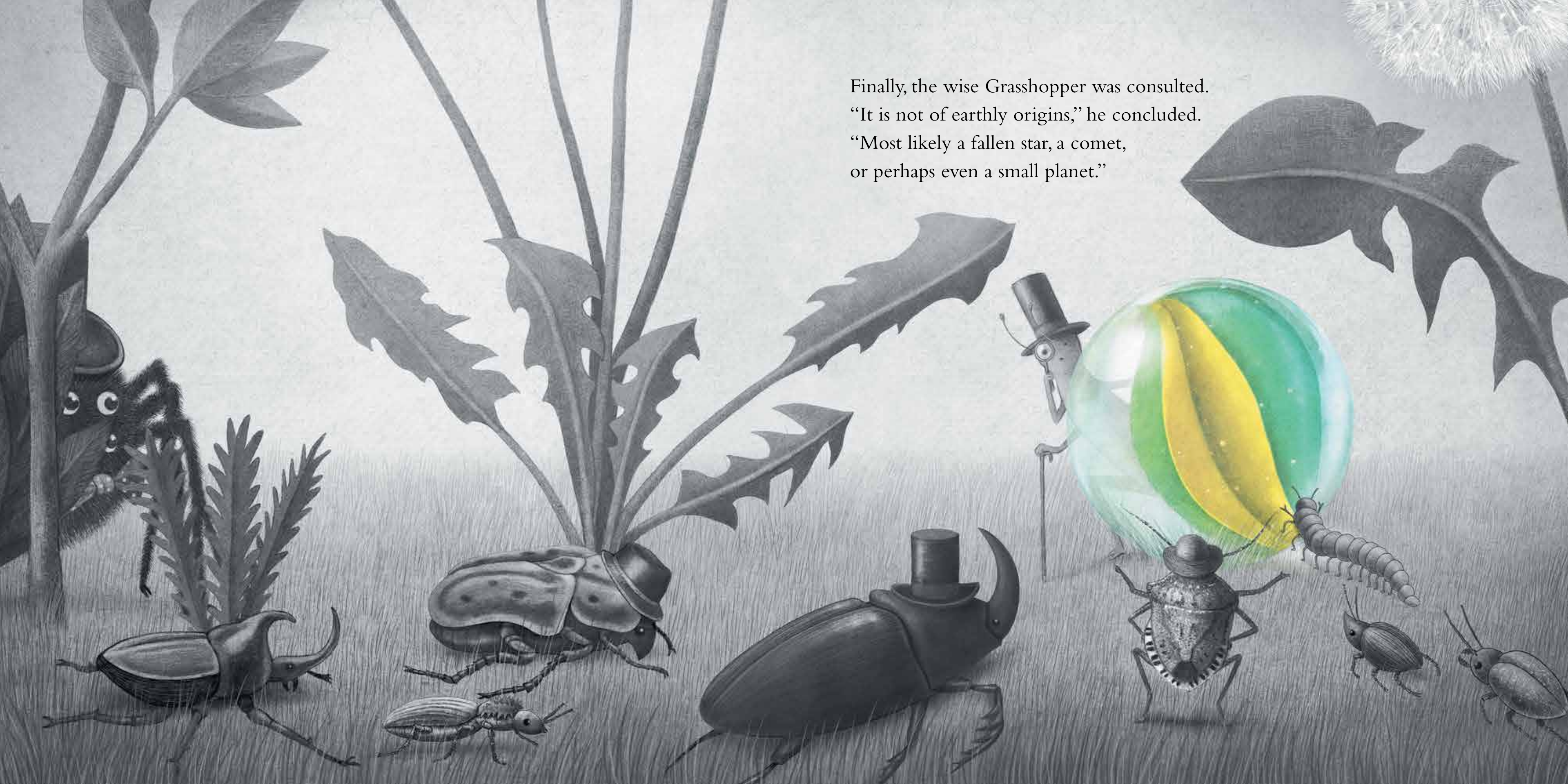
The Dung Beetle tried to
