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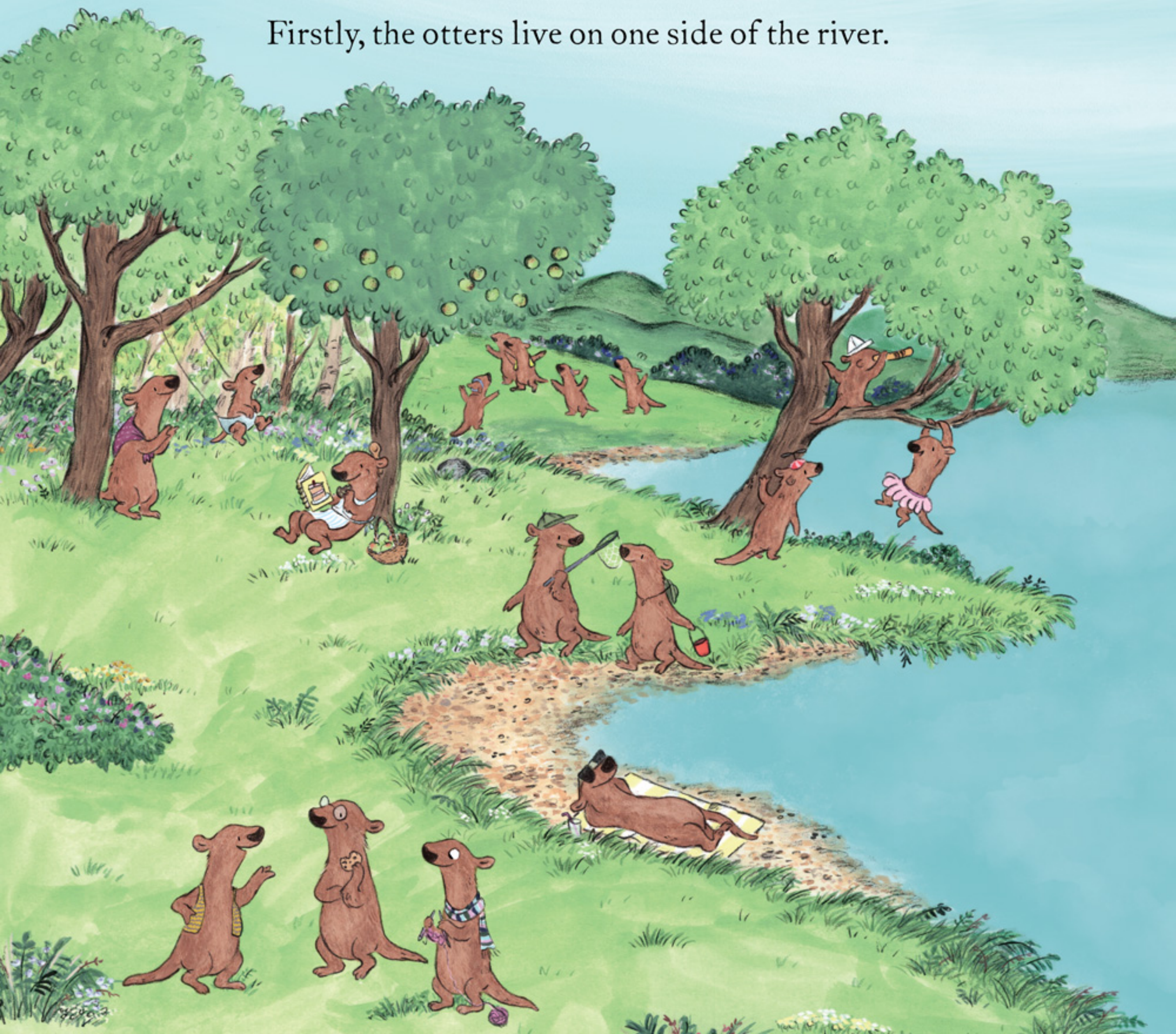

few things you should know.

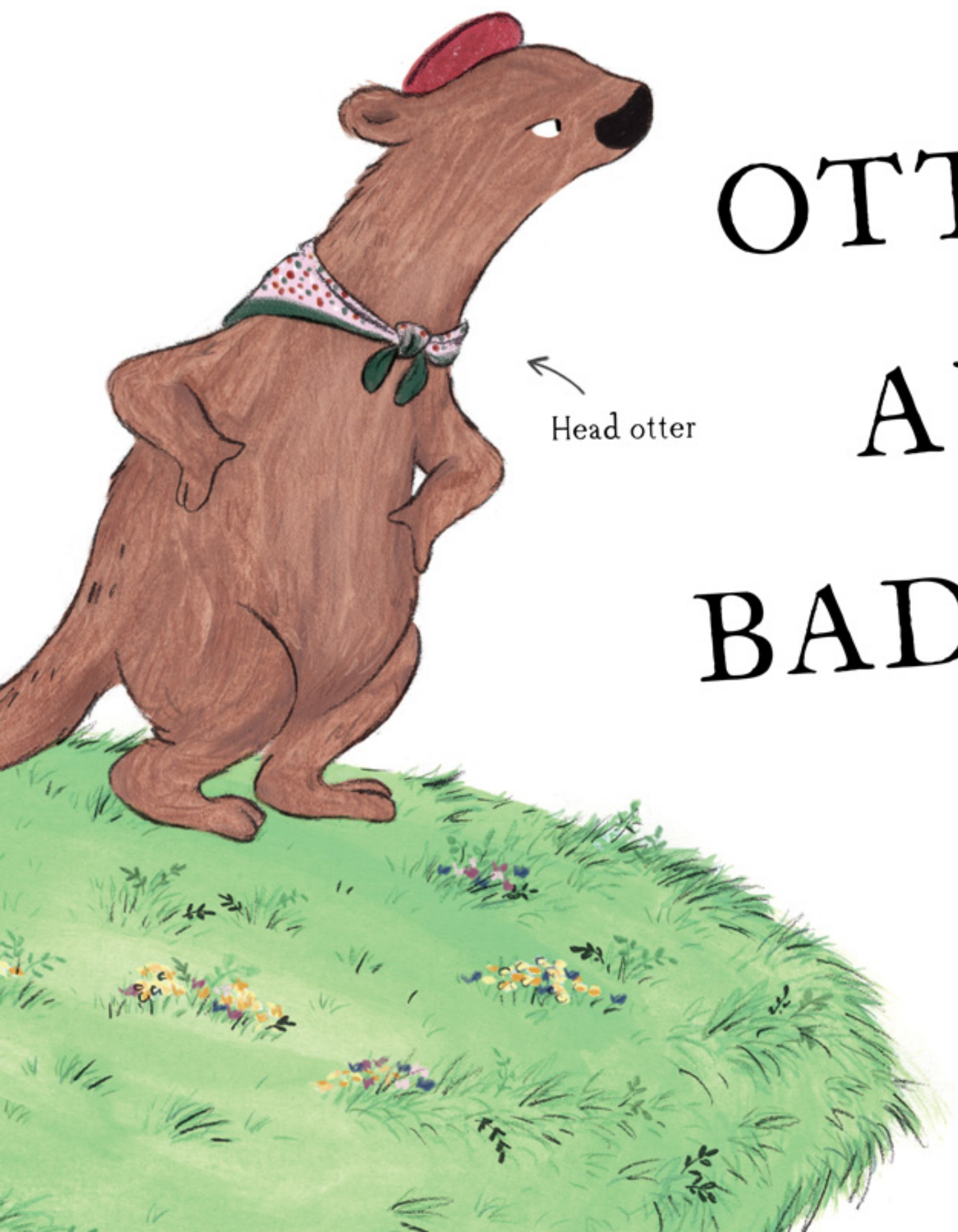
Firstly, the otters live on one side of the river.
