BE MORE PIPPI!

With these activities, you can dress like Pippi, speak like Pippi, cook like Pippi, and even have your own horse . . . just like Pippi!



DRESS UP AS PIPPI

Whether you've been invited to a Pippi party, you're dressing up for World Book Day, or you just fancy being Pippi for the day, here's how you can look the part.



'Her dress was quite peculiar. Pippi had sewn it herself. It was supposed to be blue but the blue material had run out, so Pippi had to put red patches here and there. On her long, thin legs she wore a pair of long stockings, one brown and the other black, and she was also wearing a pair of black shoes that were precisely twice as long as her feet.'

YOU WILL NEED

- Blue dress
- Red felt or paper
- Scissors
- Black marker pen
- Double-sided tape
- Pair of white socks
- Masking tape
- Brown or black fabric paint
- Paintbrush
- 4 hair ties
- 2 pipe cleaners
- Brown eye pencil

INSTRUCTIONS

1 Pippify your dress

- Cut the red felt or paper into roughly shaped patches.
- Using the black marker pen, draw 'stitches' around the edge of each felt piece.
- Fix the patches to the dress using the double-sided tape.

2 Make the stripy stockings

- Take the masking tape and stick it in circles around the white socks, one with thicker stripes than the other.
- Paint the parts that are still showing.
- Leave the socks to dry and then unpeel the masking tape.
- Alternatively, if you have them, just put on some stripy socks!

3 Do your hair and make-up

- If your hair is long enough, make two plaits, secured at the top and bottom with hair ties.
- Weave a pipe cleaner through each plait and bend them to look just like Pippi's.
- Use the eye pencil to draw on some freckles.

4 Complete the look with a pair of black shoes and you're ready to go!

MAKE A MR NILSSON MASK



Squirrel monkeys are known for being highly intelligent, and Mr Nilsson is no exception! You can channel your inner monkey with this mask.

YOU WILL NEED


- Paper
- Black marker pen
- Glue
- Brown, black, and green card
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- 20cm length of elastic
- Double-sided tape

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1 Trace the mask template and glue the paper to the brown card.
- 2 Cut out the mask, including the eye holes.
- 3 Trace the ear shapes onto paper and glue them onto the black card. Cut out.
- 4 With the brown side of the mask facing upwards, stick the ears onto the mask.
- 5 Use the hole punch to make a hole on each side of the mask and thread the elastic through, securing each end with a knot.
- 6 Trace the hat template and glue the paper to the green card.
- 7 Cut out the hat.
- 8 With the green side of the hat facing upwards, use the black marker pen to add the hatband.
- 9 Attach the hat to the top of the monkey mask with double-sided tape.



'What especially amazed Tommy and Annika was the monkey sitting on the new girl's shoulder.'



To complete the outfit, one leg of an old pair of tights stuffed with crumpled newspaper could work as a monkey tail, attached with a safety pin.

Put on your mask . . . and you're ready for some serious monkey business!

- 4 These are your three middle names: they go after your own first name and before your new last name which is—just for this game—Longstocking, of course!



MAKE YOUR OWN PIPPI PANCAKES

Pippi loves making pancakes for her friends Tommy and Annika. With this easy-to-follow recipe, you can make some scrumptious pancakes to eat with your favourite toppings.

**YOU WILL
NEED A
GROWN-UP
TO HELP YOU**

YOU WILL NEED

- 100g plain flour
- 2 large eggs
- 300ml milk
- 1 tbsp sunflower or vegetable oil, plus a little extra for frying
- Pinch of salt



'Mixy-mixy,
pancake-ixy
Bakey-bakey,
pancake-makey
Take your seaty,
pancake-eaty.'

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1 Preheat an oven to 160°C/140°C fan/gas mark 3.
- 2 Put the flour, eggs, 300ml milk, 1 tbsp of the oil and a pinch of salt into a bowl.
- 3 Whisk to a smooth batter.
- 4 Leave to rest for 30 minutes if you have time, or start cooking straight away.
- 5 Put a medium frying pan over a medium heat and carefully wipe it with some oiled kitchen paper.
- 6 When hot, add 2–3 tbsps of batter and swirl gently.
- 7 Cook until bubbles start to appear (about 1 minute).
- 8 Using the spatula to help, flip the pancake over and cook for another minute.
- 9 Transfer the pancake to the oven to keep warm while you repeat until all the pancakes are done.
- 10 Serve with a selection of yummy toppings!
