NOUN

A resolution is a promise you make to yourself to do something, often at the start of a new year.

dittodit-to
NOUN

You can use the word ditto to agree with something that has just been said, or to avoid repeating it.

• Ditto comes from the Italian word 'detto', which means 'said before'.

tectonictek-ton-ik
ADJECTIVE

Tectonic is a word that you use when you are talking about the structure of the Earth's crust.

4th
embossem-boss
VERB

If you emboss a surface such as paper or wood with a design, you make the design stand up slightly from the surface.

NOUN

A masquerade is an event, such as a party or dance, where people dress up in disguise and wear masks.

auditoriumaw-di-tor-ee-um
NOUN

The auditorium is the part of a theatre or concert hall where the audience sits.

7th
nostalgianost-ah-juh
NOUN

Nostalgia is an affectionate feeling you have for the past, especially for a particularly happy time.

8th
octaveok-tiv
NOUN

An octave is a series of eight notes in music.

• Octave comes from the Latin word 'octo', which means 'eight'.



9th unfathomable

un-fath-om-a-bul
ADJECTIVE

If you say that something is unfathomable, you mean that it cannot be understood or explained, usually because it is very strange or complicated.

10th aurora

aw-ro-ra
NOUN

An aurora is a dazzling display of coloured light, usually green, red, purple or yellow, that sometimes moves across the sky at night.

11th prevaricate

pre-var-i-kayt
VERB

If you prevaricate, you avoid giving a direct answer or making a firm decision.

12th ibis

eye-bis
NOUN

An ibis is a long-legged wading bird with a long, thin bill, typically found in warm parts of the world.

• Ibis comes from a word in the ancient Egyptian language. The Egyptians thought the ibis was a sacred bird.

13th bashfully

bash-fu-lee
ADVERB

If you say something bashfully, you say it shyly.

If you describe something as kaleidoscopic, you mean that it is made up of a lot of different colours, patterns or shapes.

15th algorithm

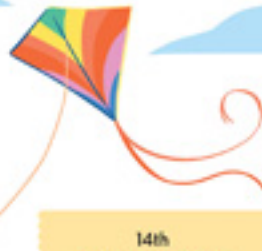
al-gor-ith-um
NOUN

An algorithm is a set of mathematical instructions that help to solve a particular problem, especially on a computer.

16th dazzling

daz-ling
ADJECTIVE

A dazzling light is so bright that you cannot see for a short time after looking at it.

NOUN

An evergreen is a plant that does not lose its leaves in the winter.

segregation

se-gr-ey-shun
NOUN

Segregation is when people are officially separated, especially based on their race or religion, so they cannot live, work or study together.

wheep

weep-ul
VERB

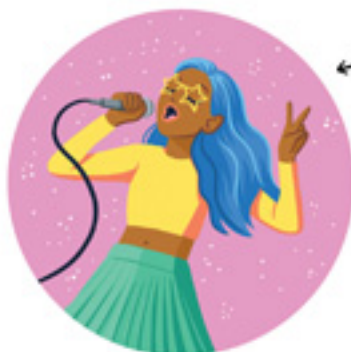
If a bird wheeps, it makes a long, shrill cry.

galumphing

gal-um-fing
ADJECTIVE

Someone or something that is galumphing is clumsy.

• Galumph was invented by the nineteenth-century English writer Lewis Carroll.

lime-lite
NOUN

If someone is in the limelight, a lot of attention is being paid to them, because they are famous or because they have done something very unusual or exciting.

hangry

hang-gree
ADJECTIVE

If someone is hangry, they are grumpy because they are hungry. You use this word in a humorous way.

• Hangry is a combination of the words 'hungry' and 'angry'.

zither

zith-ur
NOUN

A zither is a musical instrument made by stretching strings over a flat box. You pluck the strings with your fingers to make musical notes.

saffron

sa-fron
NOUN

Saffron is a yellowish-orange spice used to colour and flavour food.

• Saffron comes from a word in the Arabic language.
