



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

b. Krakatoa The eruption of Krakatoa in 1883 was so powerful that it could be heard in Australia, over 3,000 kilometres away.

2

a. A massive crater that has been on fire since 1971 Natural gas beneath the ground at Darvaza in Turkmenistan was ignited in 1971 and has been burning in a crater, also known as 'The Gateway to Hell' ever since.

3

b. Around 1,500 Molten rock that comes out of a volcano is called lava.

4

b. Pyroclastic flow There are two parts to a pyroclastic flow and both are deadly. On the ground, a thick layer of lava and rock rushes down the volcano while above it a thick wall of hot gas and ash explode downhill.


a. 20,000 That's more than 50 earthquakes every day!

c. Tectonic plates The theory that the crust of the Earth is actually broken into separate, massive 'plates' was only confirmed after the Second World War, when improved seismographs (machines that measure tremors in the earth) revealed the outlines of the tectonic plates.

b. Rocks from the Moon Scientists believe that the Moon was formed around the same time as the Earth. Dating moon rocks gave us a better idea of the Earth's age.

c. Giant's Causeway The columns were formed after molten lava that had pushed its way up through the earth, then cooled and cracked.

a. Geology The first geologist, James Hutton, discovered that the world was millions and millions of years older than people had previously thought.

a. It glows blue Sulfur in the rocks around the volcano reacts to make the lava appear blue.

11

b. Glass The conditions have to be perfect for 'lightning glass' or 'fulgurites' to be made.

12

a. 6,000 kilometres Because the Earth is not a perfect sphere, the centre of the Earth is actually 22 kilometres further away at the equator than at the poles.

b. The land is rebounding after being squashed under ice The glaciers of the ice age were incredibly heavy and squashed the land down under them. Now, centuries after the ice-sheets retreated, the land is still slowly bouncing back.

a. Geysers The world's most famous geyser, 'Old Faithful' in Yellowstone National Park erupts roughly every 90 minutes (although this varies quite a bit).




b. Tombolo

The Caspian Sea is the largest inland sea in the world. It sits between Europe and Asia. The Caspian Sea is nearly 30 metres below the average sea level of the oceans.

CONTINENTS

c. Asia

This continent is made up of 49 different countries, whose inhabitants speak over 2,000 different languages.

2

b. Australia

As this continent also includes Papua New Guinea, Tasmania and the Aru Islands, some scientists prefer the term 'Sahul' or 'Meganesia'.

3

b. Antarctica

It has taken 45 million years for the ice sheets that cover Antarctica to grow.

4

b. Africa

A desert is any area of land that doesn't get more than 25 centimetres of rain (or sleet or snow), so the largest desert in the world is actually in Antarctica. The largest hot desert is the Sahara in North Africa.

5

a. The Himalayas

The Himalayas are home to the highest mountains on the planet. The peak of Mount Everest sits well over 8 kilometres above sea level.

6

c. Africa

There are 54 countries in Africa, 49 in Asia and 44 in Europe.

a. North America

Despite being full of fossils, the Grand Canyon has no dinosaur fossils because the rocks in the canyon were made around a billion years before dinosaurs evolved.

b. Australia
