KIDS

- 1 **False** - The name is believed to come from the French *jolie rouge*, meaning 'pretty red'. This may have been a jokey way of referring to early pirate flags, which were red.
- 2 **True** - It was also used by soldiers in the Roman army from around the 3rd century BCE to the 3rd century CE.
- 3 **False** - The Aztecs controlled a huge empire in what is now Mexico. It was overthrown by invading Spanish forces in the 16th century.
- 4 **False** - There haven't even been 50 presidents yet.
- 5 **True** - Although Vikings are often depicted in illustrations as having horns on their helmets, no such headgear has ever been found.



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- 6 **True** - She reigned for 70 years from 1952-2022. That's seven years longer than the next longest reign, that of Queen Victoria from 1837-1901.
- 7 **True** - Bolivar (1783-1830) led a revolution in the 19th century. This saw the countries of Bolivia, Colombia, Venezuela, Ecuador, Peru and Panama break away from the Spanish Empire to become independent. The currency of Venezuela is named the bolivar in his honour.

- 8 **True** - Several types of electric car were invented in late 19th and early 20th centuries. However, by the 1910s, petrol-powered cars had become much more popular and production of electric cars was stopped for several decades.
- 9 **False** - The war actually lasted for over 116 years from 1337-1453. Though the war didn't technically end, the fighting was interrupted by truces and two periods of peace between 1360-1369 and 1389-1415.
- 10 **False** - When it set sail in 1912, the Titanic was the biggest ship that had ever been built, but the average modern cruise ship is around 40 per cent larger.

- 1 **True** - Unbelievable as it may seem, the three mass murderers were all nominated for the prize. Mussolini was nominated in 1935, the same year Italy invaded Abyssinia. Hitler was nominated in 1939, the same year he started World War II and Stalin was nominated in both 1945 and 1948 as the heights of the Cold War. None of the men won the prize.
- 2 **True** - It wasn't the largest empire by area. That was the British Empire, which at its peak in 1923 covered around a quarter of Earth's land. But that was made up of many different territories. The Mongol Empire of the 13th and 14th centuries was a single territory across much of Asia and Europe, and amounting to around a fifth of Earth's land area.
- 3 **False** - It remains a popular myth that Washington had dentures made of wood. He did have false teeth but they were made of various materials, including ivory, gold and even other people's teeth (ugh!).
- 4 **False** - The Vikings made several journeys to North America - and set up some short-lived colonies there - in the 10th and 11th centuries.
- 5 **False** - The wreck of the Titanic was found on purpose, by the American oceanographer Robert Ballard, using a remote-controlled submarine vehicle in 1985.
- 6 **True** - The Anglo-Zanzibar War of 1896 between Britain and the small African island of Zanzibar (now part of Tanzania) lasted just 38 minutes.
- 7 **True** - Cleopatra died in 30 BCE, just over 2,050 years ago, whereas the Great Pyramid was completed in around 2560 BCE, or over 2,500 years before Cleopatra's time.
- 8 **True** - The internet, a network of computers able to communicate with each other, was invented in the 1960s. Berners-Lee invented the World Wide Web in 1989, as a means of retrieving information from the internet by using hyperlinks.
- 9 **False** - The city is believed to have been briefly named Barmatia after one of its founders, John Barmat, in 1895.
- 10 **False** - This is a story that's often told about Caligula. However, it appears that the emperor only talked about making his horse (called Incitatus, meaning 'swift') a consul, but didn't actually do it - possibly because he was assassinated before he was able to.
