MONSTERS AND MYTHICAL BEASTS.

AS WELL AS BELIEVING in the Olympian gods, the ancient Greeks believed the world was populated with terrible monsters and fabulous beasts. Most of these creatures were relatives of the gods or Titans. The Gorgona, for example, were three navage sisters. Descendants of Guia and the sea, they had wings of gold and snakes for hair. Only one, Medusa, was mortal and all who looked upon her were turned to stone.



PERSEUS AND THE GORGONS.

Only one here was brave enough to face the Gorgons: the demigod Persons. He was the child of Dange and Zens. The story goes that Persons and his mother were locked in a chest and east into the sea by a wicked king named Acrivius. The elect landed at Scriphos, where King Polydectes fell in love with Danas and wanted to get rid of Persons, When Perseus boasted that he could fetch him Medusa's head, the king was delighted. Persons could not achiere his boast until he was helped by Hermes and Athena, who gave him a seythe and shield. They led

him to the Graege-three cropes with one eve and one tooth between them, who were the Corpons' sisters. Persens stole the eye and touth to make the Gracue tell him where the Goreons were. They also told him how to find three nymphs, who leut him a cup of invivibility, a purse and winged sandals, Then, Persons flow invisible to the Gorgons and fought Medina by looking at her reflection in his shield. He cut off Medusa's head, placed it in the purse and returned with it to Scriphos, where he

Many ancient Greek monsters looked part human. The Cyclones. for example, who made Zeus's famous thunderbolt. looked like giant humans with only one eye each. The centagry were a race of beings that had a man's torse on a horse's body. Some, like Chiron, were scise teachers, but most were warlike. They were defeated with the help of Theseus, the Athenian hero who also slew the bull-headed Minotage in

the Labyrinth of Crete.

With the face of a woman, the body of a fion and the usuge of a hird, it terrorised the city of Thelies, strangling anyone who could not answer its riddle; "What goes on hour legs in the morning, two at noon and three in the evening?" The hero he is old, he uses a stick, making "three legs". Occlipus hit upon the answer: "Man". Occlipus Having been defeated, the Sphina destroyed itself.



The Calvidonian boar was one of the ficrosst breasts in the Greek myths, although it looked like an ordinary boar. Most mythical heasts were funtactical blends of many animals. The firebreathing Chimaera, for example, had a lion's head, a dragon's tail and a gout's body. It was slain by the bero Bellerophson. who also tumed another beast, the uinged horse Peganis, ming a magic bridle that was given to him. by the goddess Athena.

THE WAR AGAINST TROY.

IN TURKEY LIES THE PLAIN where the town of Troy oney stood. The walls of the town were said to luve been built by Poscidon himself. It was surrounding these walls that the most famous war in all of Greek mythology took place - the Trojan War, When Helen, the wife of the Greek king Menelans, was abducted by Paris, a prince of Troy, a thousand Greek ships set sail for Troy to lay siege to the city and rescue her.

to rescue Helen. They laid siege to the city in a war


that lasted ten years, with each side being helped

ACHILLES

The Greek hero Arbilles was nearly invulnerable because his mother had dipped him in the River Stor. as a baby. In doing so, she had held him by his heel, and so that did not get wet and remained vulnerable. At one stage during the Trojan War, Achilles refused to fight. The Greeks began to lose, and so his friend Patrochis doined his armour in order to give the Greeks the impression that Achilles was lighting with them once more. The ruse worked, but Patroclus was slain. Augrily, Achilles fought and killed Hector, the mightiest champion of the Trojans, and the brother of Paris. But Achilles himself was slain by an arrow shot by Paris, which struck him in his vulnerable beel,



THE TROJAN HORSE.

After the death of Achilles at the hands of Paris, the Greeks were unsure how to continue their war against the Trojans. For although they wen many battles against them on the scide plain in front of the city, they were unable to get into the city of Troy itself. And as long as the walls of Troy stood, they could not finish the war by actually rescuing Helen. But then the Greek hero Odysseus came up with a cuuning plan to break the deadlock.

Odysseus ordered the Greeks to build an ensemons horse - a symbol of the god Poseidon out of wood. He then hid in the hollow helly of the horse with a number of other Greek heroes, while the main Greek fleet set sail, pretending that they had given up hope of winning the war and were returning home to Greece. In reality, the fleet merely sailed to the nearby island of Tenedos and maited out of eight. The Trojans, believing the Greek arms had finally left them, dragged the wooden horse into the city in delight. But that night, Odysseus and the Greek hernes crept down out of the wooden horse and opened the gates of Toxi-The Greek fleet returned in the night, and tilta soldiers flooded into the city.
