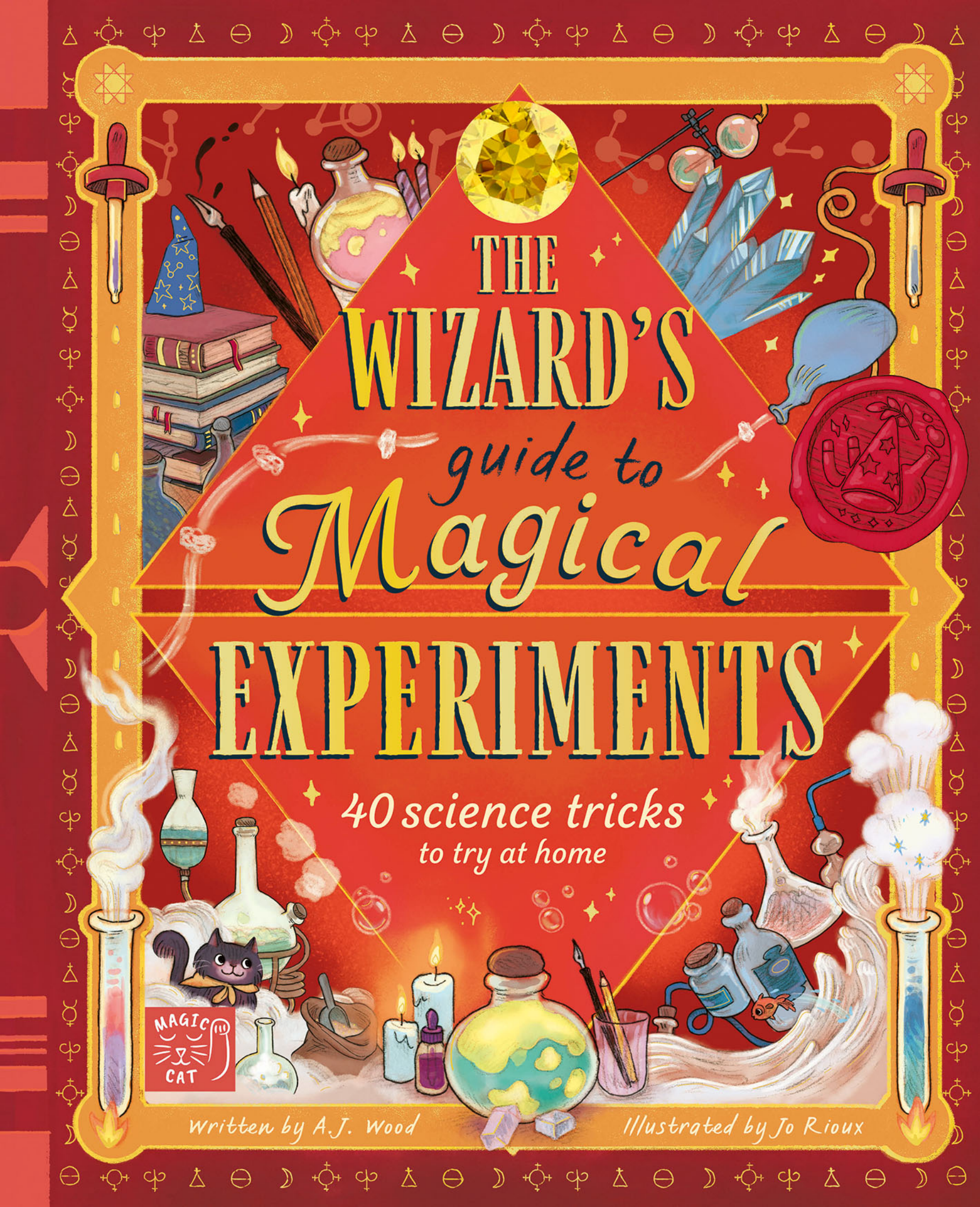


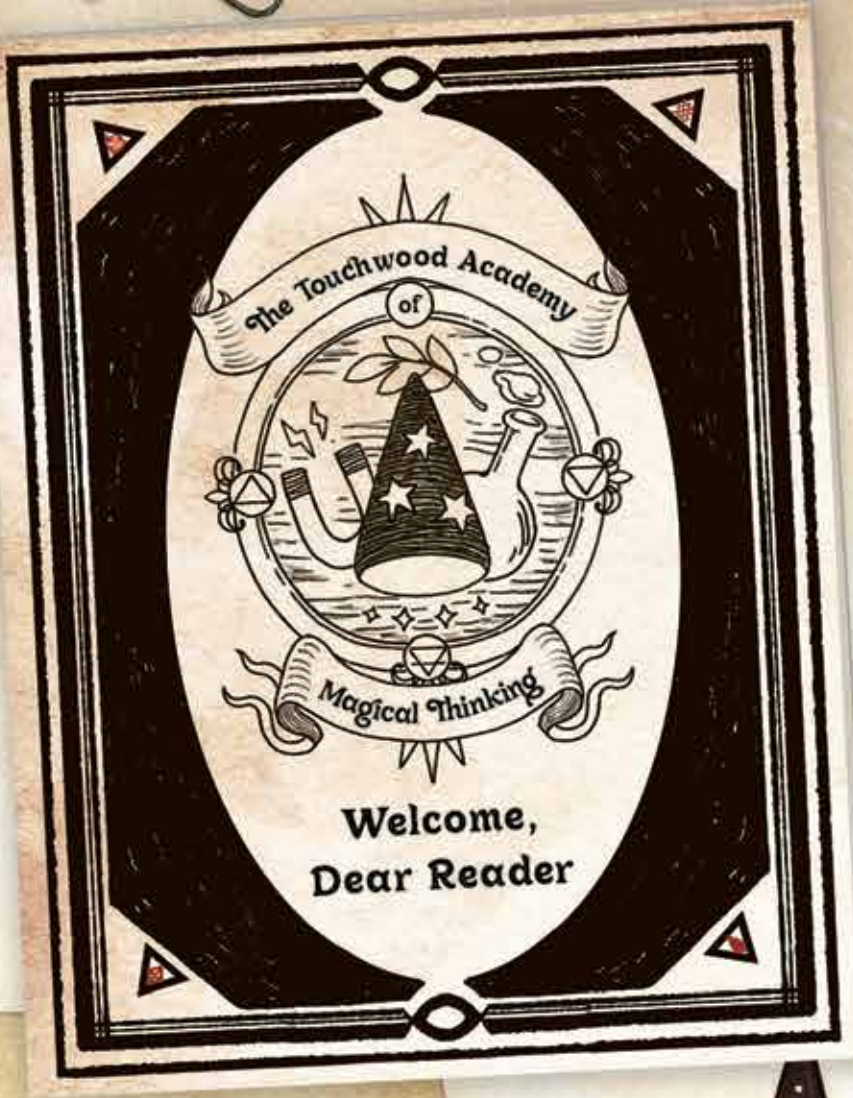

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WHAT IS THE WORLD MADE OF?

Before we start our experiments, there is something important you need to understand. And that is that every physical thing in the world is made of **MATTER**, whether it's a mountain or a mouse, a chair or a cookie.

And all that matter is made up of teeny-tiny things called **ATOMS**. Yes, even you!

Understanding that **ATOMS** have positive and negative parts is the first lesson for any wizardling to master.

EXPERIMENT

10 MINUTES

HOPPING LADYBIRDS

MATERIALS: sheet of red paper, black felt-tip pen, hole punch, 2 balloons

- 1► Use the hole punch to cut 10 to 20 small red circles from the paper. Add some black spots so they look like little ladybirds.
- 2► Spread the circles out over the surface of a clean table so they're not touching.
- 3► Blow up two balloons and, once you've tied each end, give one to an audience member. Leave the room momentarily and rub your balloon against your hair or woolly jumper for about 20 seconds. Your hair needs to be clean, by the way. So does your jumper!
- 4► Ask the audience member to hold their balloon over your paper bugs. Nothing will happen. Now hold your balloon over the bugs, about 5 cm away, while saying your magic words. Your bugs should hop up and stick to your balloon.

MAKE WATER BEND

MATERIALS: paper cup, sharp pencil, balloon, water

- 1► Make some preparations before you gather your audience. Make a small hole in the bottom of your paper cup with the sharp point of a pencil.
- 2► Blow up your balloon, tie off the end, and then rub it on your hair until your hair starts sticking to it.
- 3► Call your audience together. Hold the cup over a sink or bowl and fill it with water. The water should flow out of the hole in a thin, straight stream.
- 4► Slowly move the balloon towards the stream of water while saying your magic spell. Watch as the stream of water magically bends towards the balloon.

When you rub the balloon on your hair, negatively charged electrons transfer to the balloon.

When you hold the balloon near the water, the positive ends of the water molecules are attracted to the balloon's negative charge, which makes the stream of water **BEND**.

The Periodic Table

Everything in the whole world is made from just 118 different types of atoms. See how many you can recognise from the chart overleaf.

WHY DO LADYBIRDS HOP?

The balloon rubs electrons off of your jumper, giving the balloon a negative charge. When you hold it near your ladybirds, the **POSITIVE** part of each paper bug is attracted to the **NEGATIVELY** charged balloon.

These charges **OVERCOME** THE FORCE OF GRAVITY...

...AND THE BUGS HOP UPWARD, TOWARD THE BALLOON.

For these spells, I use the magic words "ALTE VOLANTI!"
