# THE SEASONS

Plants will look different depending on which season of the year you see them.

#### SPRING

Most plants are just putting out their first shoots. Flowers like primroses, wild daffodils and violets start to bloom. Soon yellow celandines and dandelions can be seen in the grass verges. Later, bluebells, wild garlic and wood anemones in the woods show that summer is on its way.

#### SUMMER

Early summer is the time when the roadside banks are full of campions, cow parsley, stitchwort, dog daisies, buttercups and clover Foxgloves bloom in the woods, thrift and bladder campions by the sea.

#### AUTUMN

As summer passes, you will start to see seedheads and fruits replacing some flowers. Other flowers keep going until the weather gets cold Look out for bindweed on hedges and fences and Michaelmas daisies by the road.

#### WINTER

" In winter many plants completely disappear as the temperature drops, and everything looks dead. But gorse, with its bright yellow flowers, blooms even in the coldest weather Watch out for the first leaves of daffodils and bluebells pushing up through the cold ground, and when the tiny white snowdrops appear, spring is not far behind



## LOOKING AT FLOWERS



A primrose has five petals.



A daisy has hundreds.



Sepals

Most flowers have a set of little green leaves at the back of the petals called sepals.

#### Stamens



You can find these in the centre of the flower They have pollen on them ~ yellow dust.

### TYPES OF LEAVES



Several leaves grouped together to make one.



Dandelion

Small rounded leaves with a slight shine.



Large leaves, soft and downy with crinkled wavy edges.

Blueber

Leaves with uneven, toothed edges.

The leaf is as important as the flower when you are trying to identify a plant. Look at the size, the shape and the texture. Often plants with similar flowers have quite different leaves.
