Dear Natural History Museum,

EXCEPT that, in future, any member of staff removing items from displays MUST obtain permission from me BEFORE they do so. This will mean explaining, in writing, WHY.

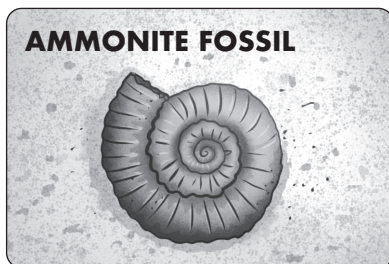
