? 'Or a heart shape?' said Clover.



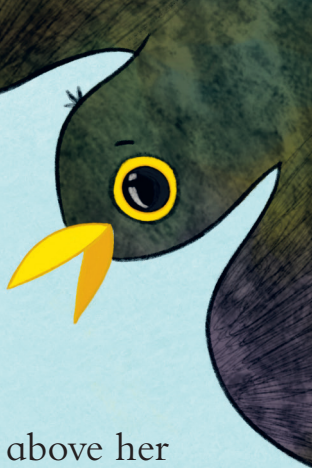
'Bea is quite capable of choosing one herself!' said Willow, laughing. Bea held
