AFRICAN SHAMANS

Medicine men or *watch doctors*.

The shaman of Africa are often misunderstood.

The shamans of central Africa have a great love of elaborate costumes, often donning masks, headdresses and other paraphernalia to perform their spells, and accompanying the reading of the spell itself with all manner of dancing and noise-making. This is surelyナンセンス but, along with their unsoothed reputation for commanding evil spirits, has led them to be greatly feared, especially by strangers. This often works to the shaman's advantage since he tends to be left alone to hone his powerful healing skills. Instead of being constantly pestered by those seeking magical cures for the most minor of ailments.

Take your cures. African shamans often have a familiar assigned to various known regards or details of popular culture, although raptors, mammals, and even hippocampus have been known. The latter are said to be recommended to any but the truly experienced ones; they have a reputation for being uncontrollable, coupled with having a very short life.

INDIAN FAKIRS

Among the wisest of all wizards, fakirs avoid all involvement in worldly affairs.

Of all the wizards of the world, the fakirs of India are amongst the most mysterious. Little is known of their magic since they rarely speak, often choosing to remove themselves from the everyday world and instead spend months in curious pursuits such as balancing on one leg, or laying on a bed of nails. This helps them to focus their minds and concentrate their wizardly powers so that whenever they do speak it is to utter only words of the purest wisdom.

• GREAT SNAKES •

The fakir often shuns all human possessions, wearing nothing, and wearing only tags. However, as with all wizards, fakirs recognise the value of having a familiar, and often choose a snake, particularly a cobra. There are also masters of the art of蛇術—a form of divination involving the reading of signs observed by observing a pair of snakes.



NORTH AMERICAN SHAMANS

The greatest of *healers*, the vast open spaces of the *New World* are home to these major *habitats* of the *magical world*.



THE SHAMANS OF NORTH AMERICA have a deep understanding of the natural world. They can talk to almost all species of animal and know the uses of most types of plant, preparing healing potions and poultices from ancient recipes. Instead of recording their knowledge in books, it is passed down verbally. Similarly, these powerful workers of true magic tend to shun the elaborate trappings of modern life, choosing simple stones, bones, sticks or feathers as their magical items, endowing them with enormous power through use of their ancient spellcraft. They are also masters of the art of dream-catching and can control the dreams of others. If you suddenly start dreaming of herds of buffalo you may have been unknowingly in contact with a shaman.



Round and round the totem pole
Many shamans focus magical force by dancing and drumming round a pole, known as a *totem*.

Feathered Friends
Shamans often choose birds as their *familiars*. Eagles, crows, owls and hawks are all popular choices; the newly-introduced chicken is also gaining favour, as its eggs are used for breaking.
