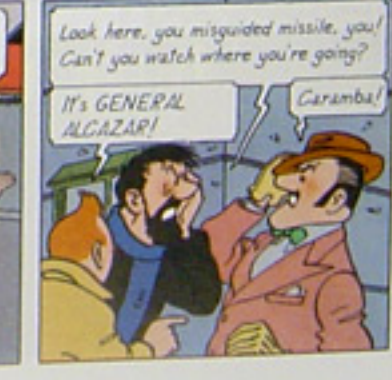
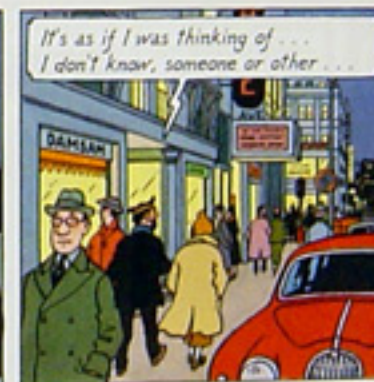


So much for your peace and quiet, Captain! Look over there. There's a big storm brewing.

Yes, it's high time we got back to the house.



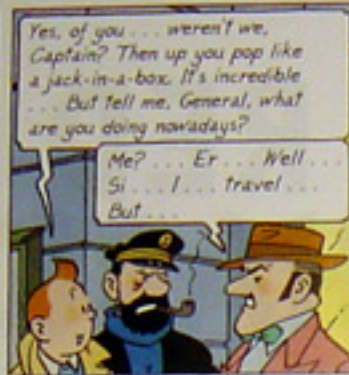
THE RED SEA SHARKS

Por favor ... excuse please ... In mucho hurry ... Already late for appointment ... I go now.

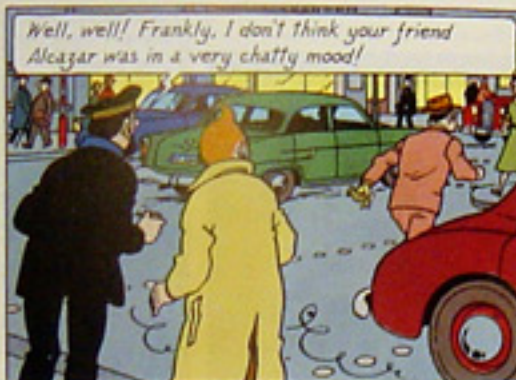
Oh, what a pity ... At all events, here's my address. And where can we find you, General?

Now then, let's see what's inside here.



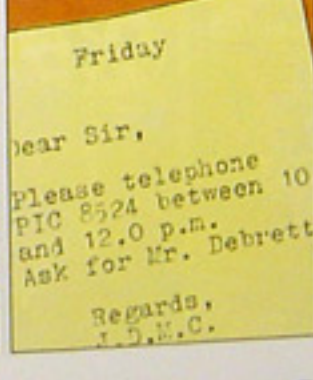

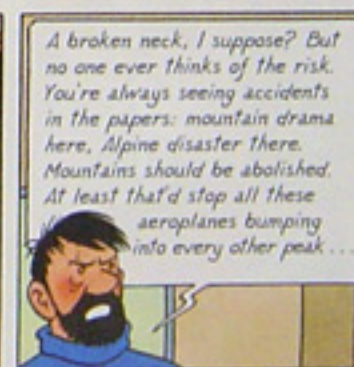
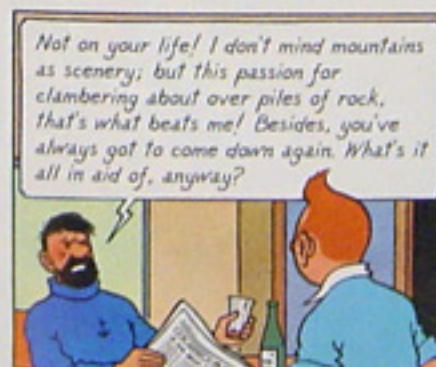


But the general's address isn't here. I know, but I'll ring up the number given in the letter.

Yes. I was dreaming about Chang... you remember Chang, the boy I made friends with in China... I saw him... it was ghastly...

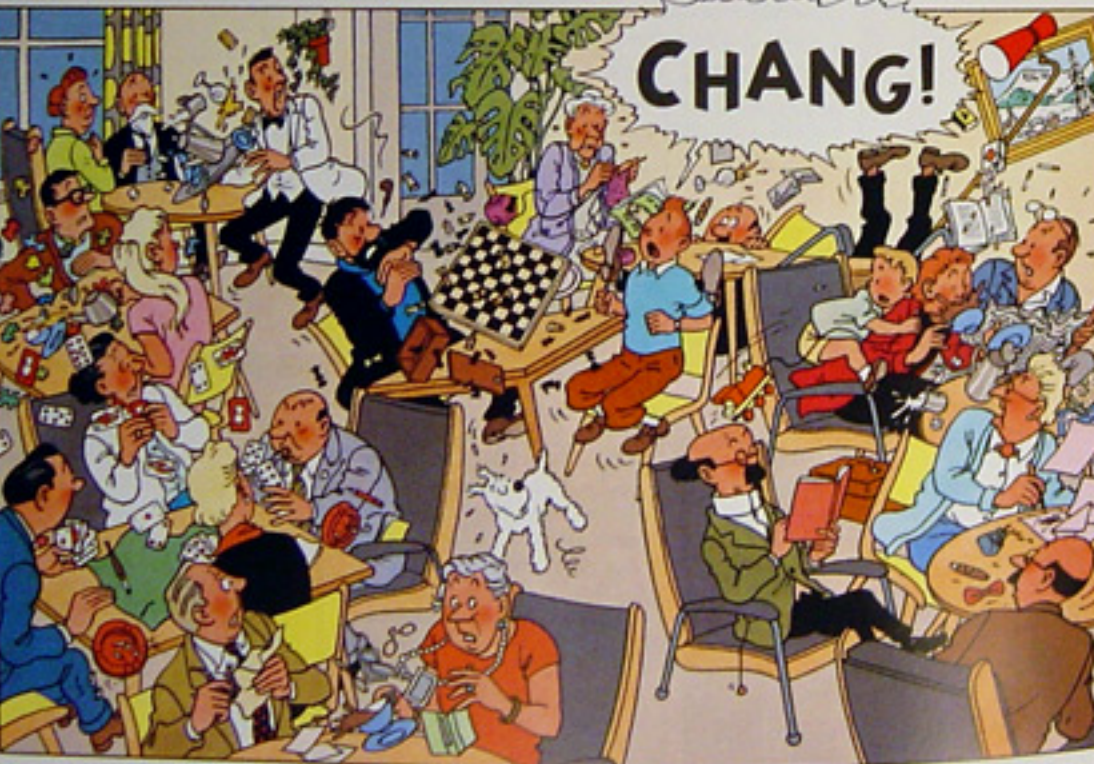
