




RABBIT AND DONKEY lived in the same field. Donkey spent his days in the corner nodding his head wisely and chewing on grass.

"I will teach you what I know," said Donkey, "which is a lot. Listen and you will learn."


"Goody," said Rabbit. "Yes, please."

"I will sit still," said Rabbit. "I will sit still and listen."






Donkey began. "I am going to tell you why the sky is blue." "Goody," said Rabbit. "I really want to know why the sky is blue."
