
Muddy Experiments


1. Using a spade, dig up some soil. The deeper you go, the more likely it is that you'll find creatures in it.



2. Place a spade full of soil in one of your containers.



3. Take a spoonful of dirt and shake it through the sieve over your other container.



5. Is there a creature left in the sieve? If there is, write down its name, or draw a picture of it to keep a record. If you don't know what it is, try to find out.

4. Look at your soil through the magnifying glass. See how many creatures you can find.



6. Don't forget to put the creatures back in the soil when you've finished.

Potty Potatoes

Bentley loves to dig and his favourite thing to dig for is potatoes. Maggie is planting some potatoes so Bentley will have something to dig for in the summer. These potatoes won't be in a big field, they'll be in a pot so Maggie calls them Potty Potatoes.

STUFF TO USE

 A few old potatoes that have started to sprout shoots


 Soil

 Water

 Big plastic bucket / container

 Stones or gravel

1. Put your old potatoes in the sun for about two weeks to harden.



2. Take your bucket or container and ask a grown-up to make some drainage holes in the bottom of it for you.



3. Fill the bottom with a layer of stones and gravel – this is to help with drainage.



4. Add a small layer of soil – about 20 centimetres deep.




5. Place three of your potatoes in the bucket. Make sure they have enough room between them to grow and that the sprouts are facing up.



6. Now add some more soil, just enough to cover the potatoes fully.



7. Find a good spot for your potatoes that is warm but not too sunny. Keep checking them to see if any shoots appear. When they do, cover them with more soil. Do this until your container is full.



8. Make sure you water your plants and keep them well covered from the sun. Potatoes can go green in the sun and then they are poisonous!



9. When your plants start to flower it means your potatoes are ready – yay!



Now gently dig them up and wash all the dirt off them.
