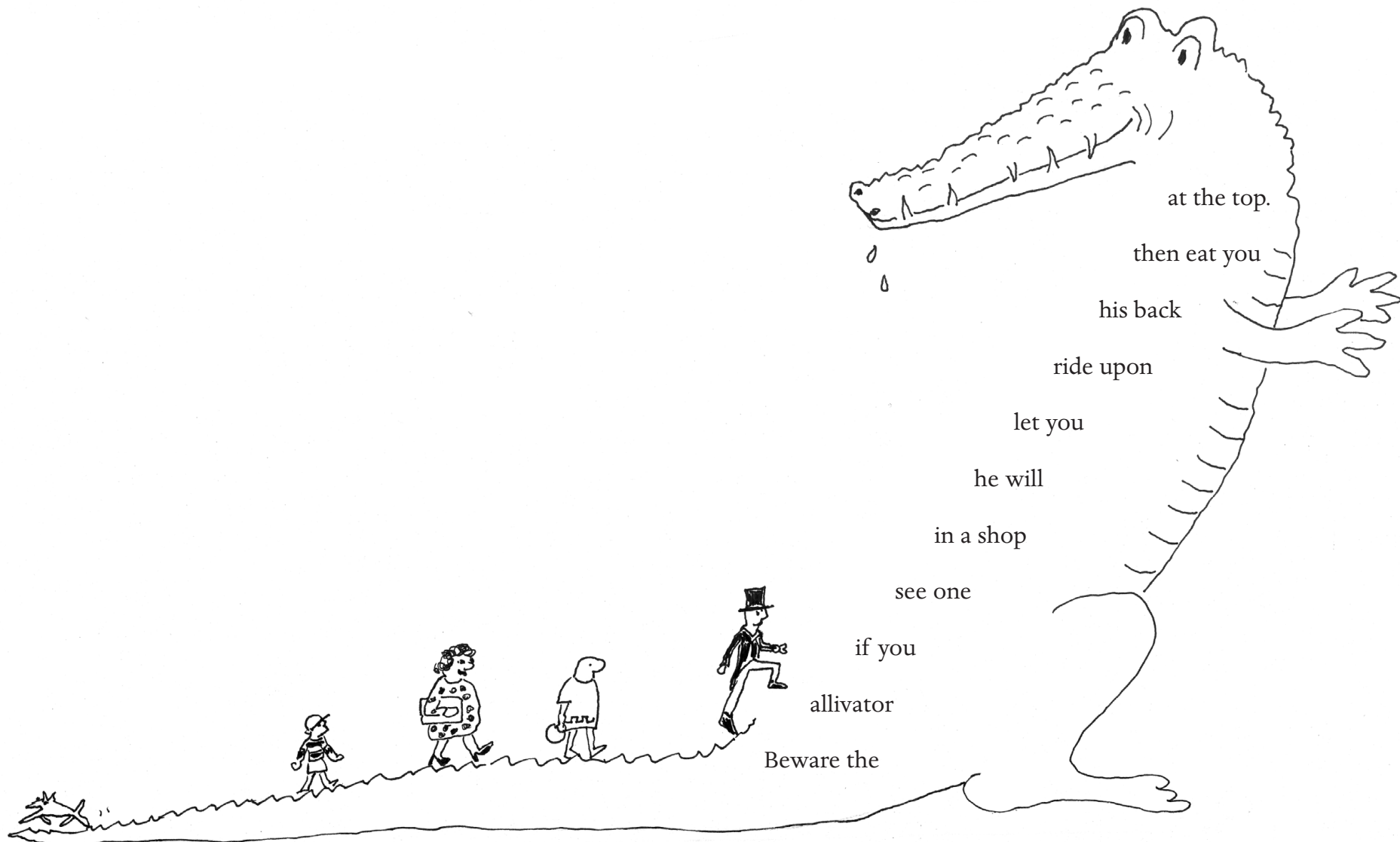

Blue Macaw

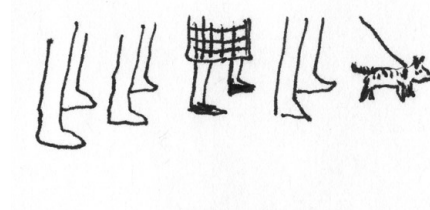
I used to keep a blue macaw
in my bedside bottom drawer

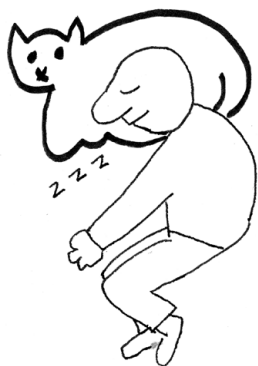
But he was never happy there

when they fall in love

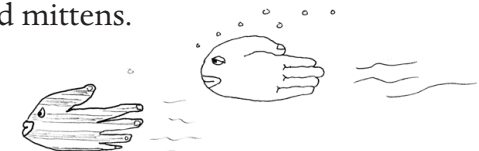
and when
