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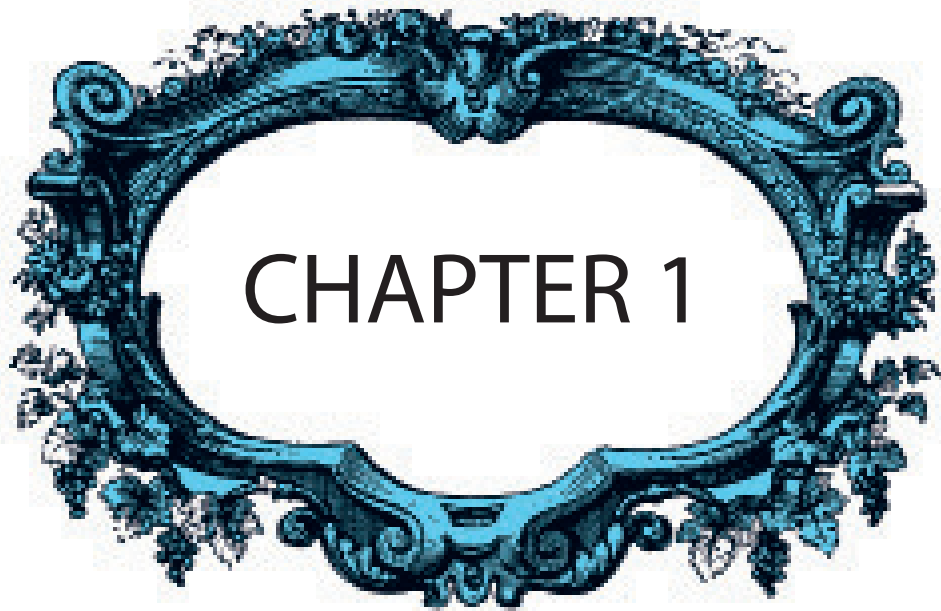
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This is Cudweed.



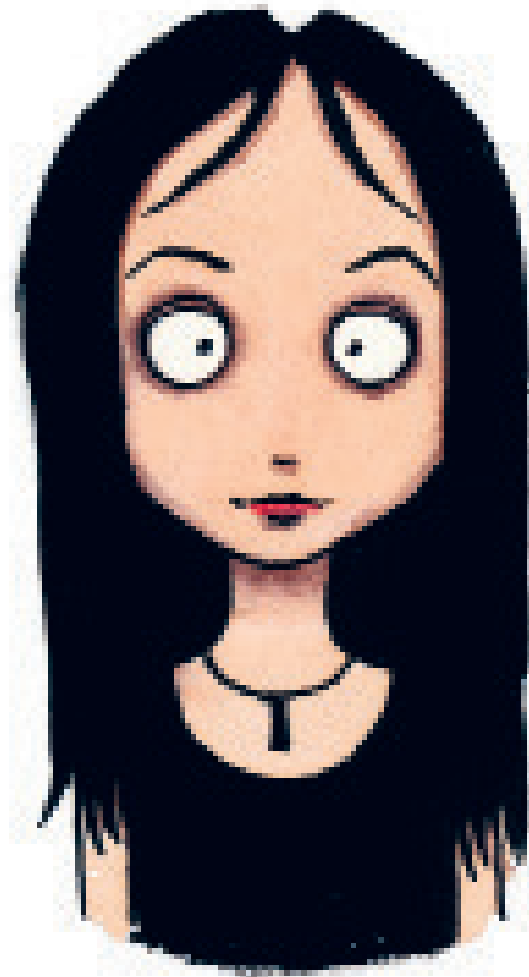
If you think he looks funny, you

This is the story of what happened one day when Cudweed decided to read a comic...

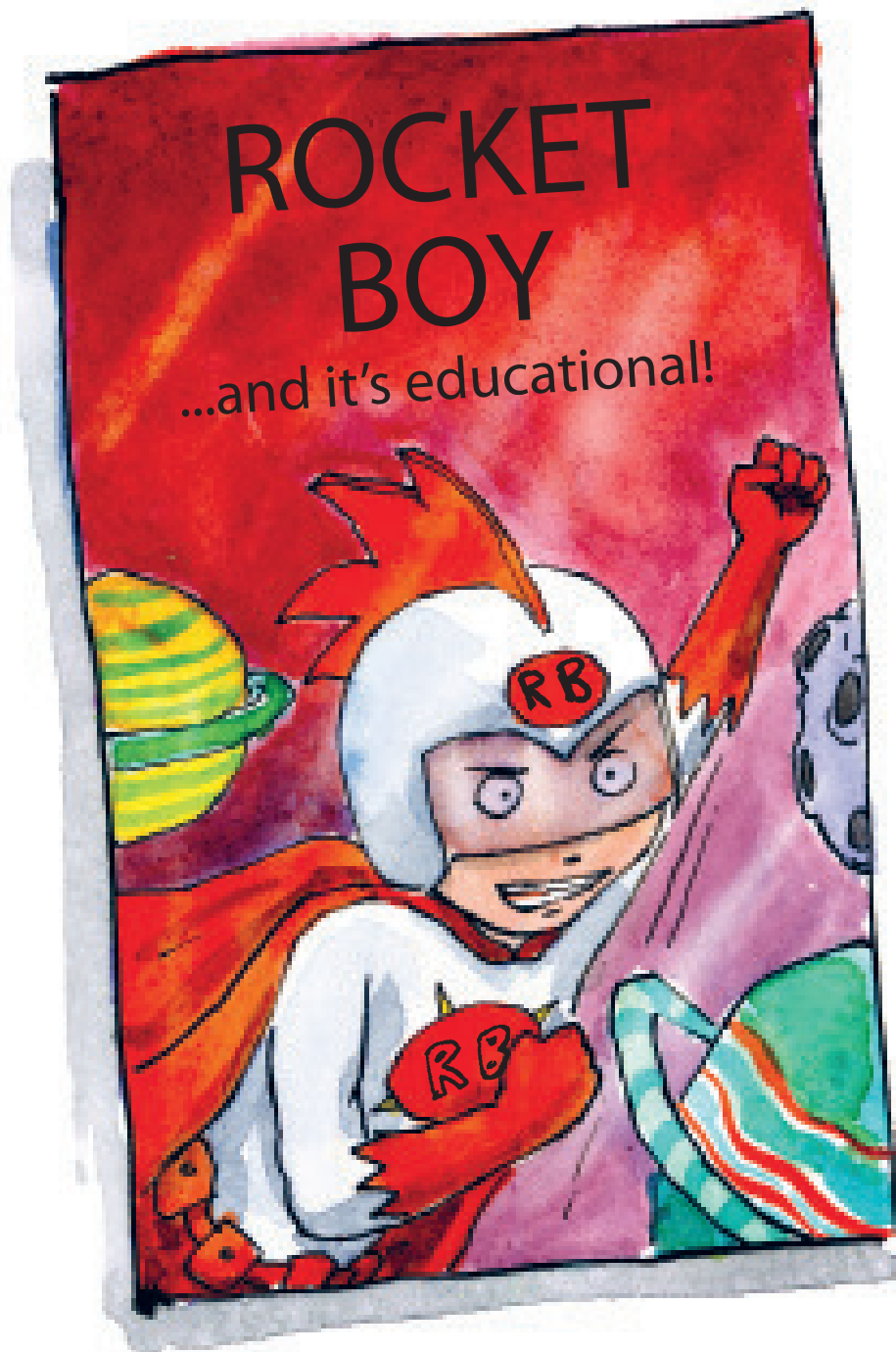


Now, you might think that it would be hard to get into trouble by reading a comic. Yes?

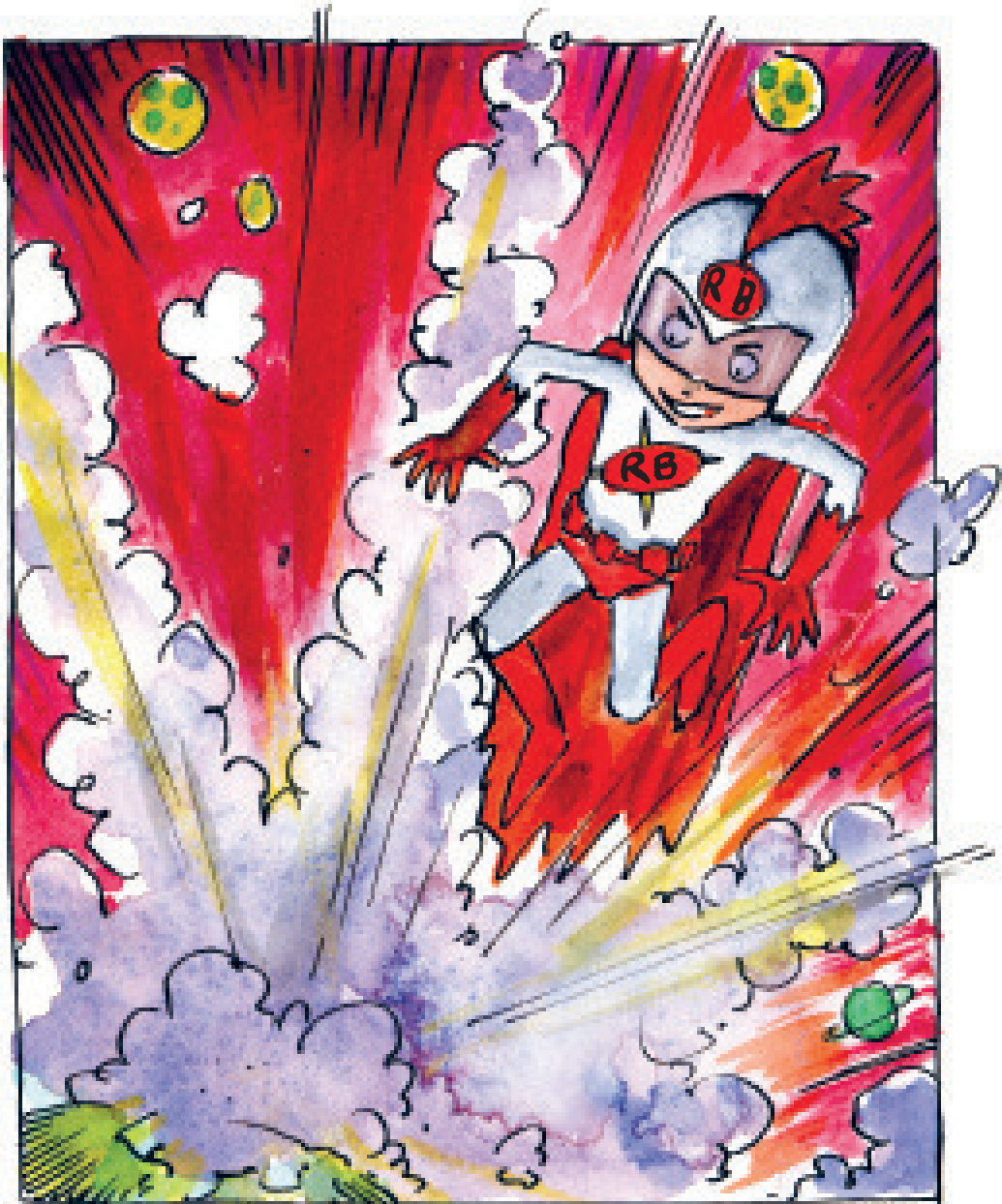


No! Not if your name is Cudweed

Cudweed had found the comic in an old box in the attic. It was called Rocket Boy, and it looked like this:



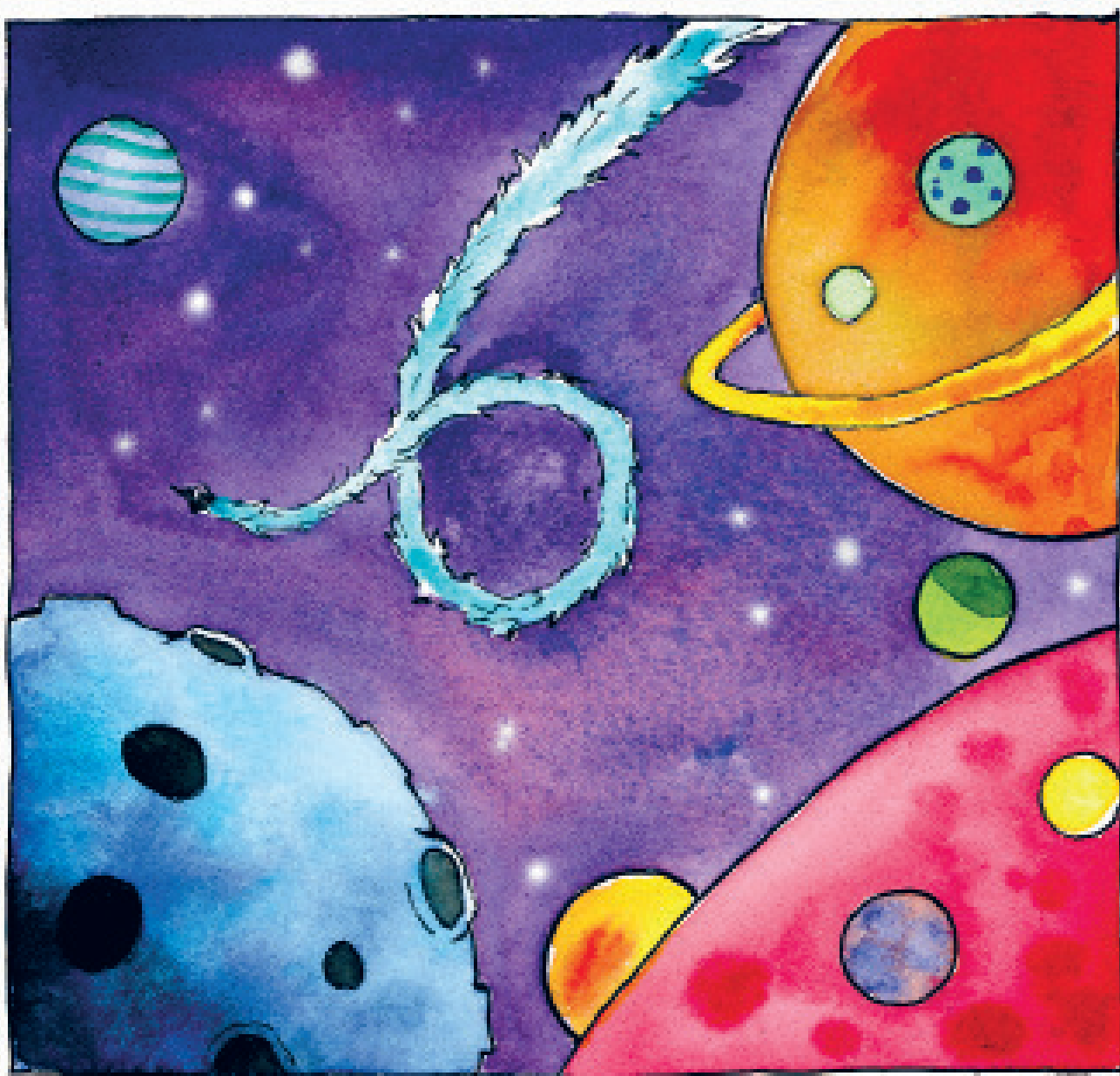
Cudweed read about the

Cudweed thought Rocket Boy was cool. Soon he started thinking that he was Rocket Boy himself!



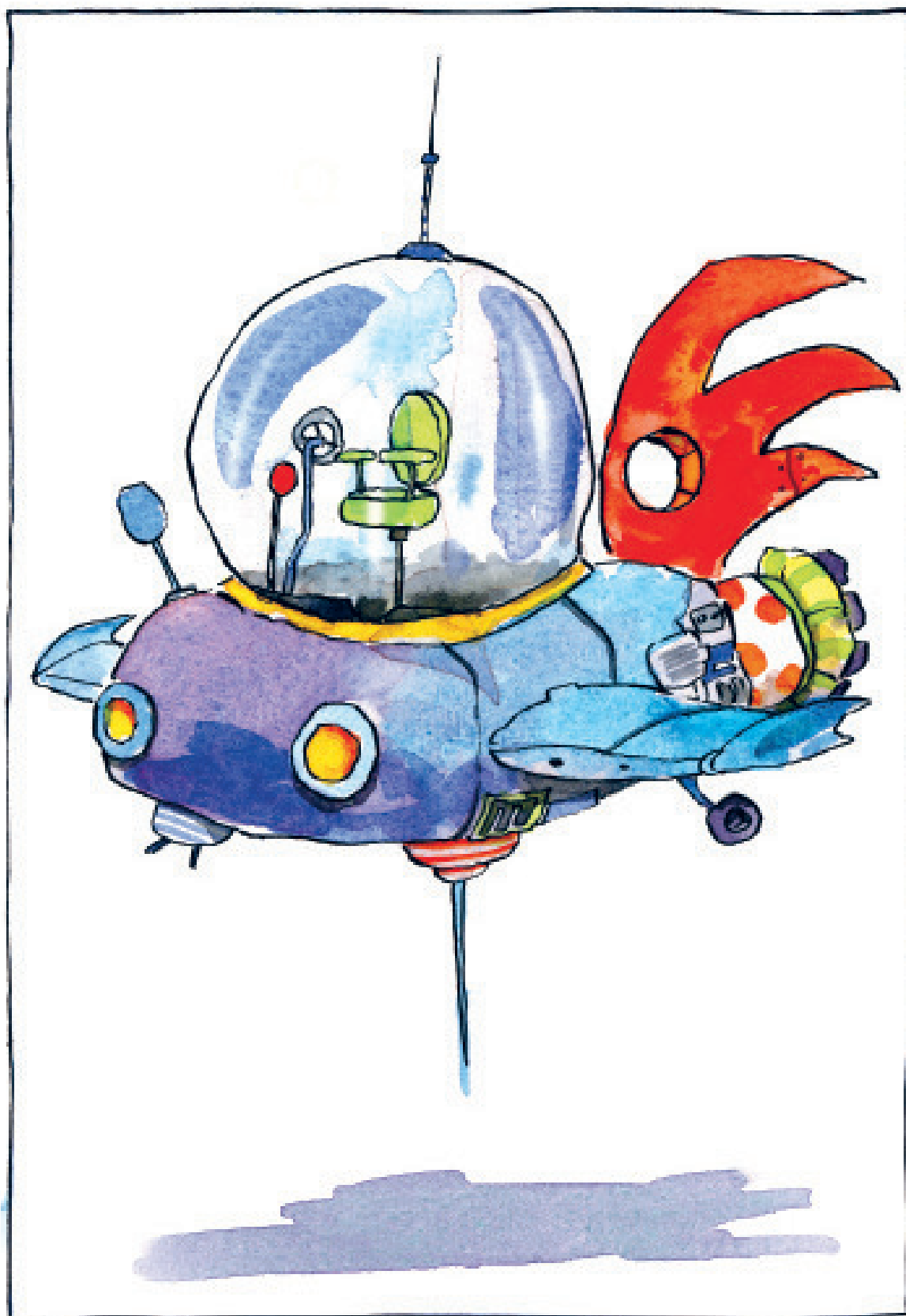
The thing that Cudweed liked best about Rocket Boy was Rocket Boy's spaceship.

Cudweed felt sad and bored and worried, all at the same time.

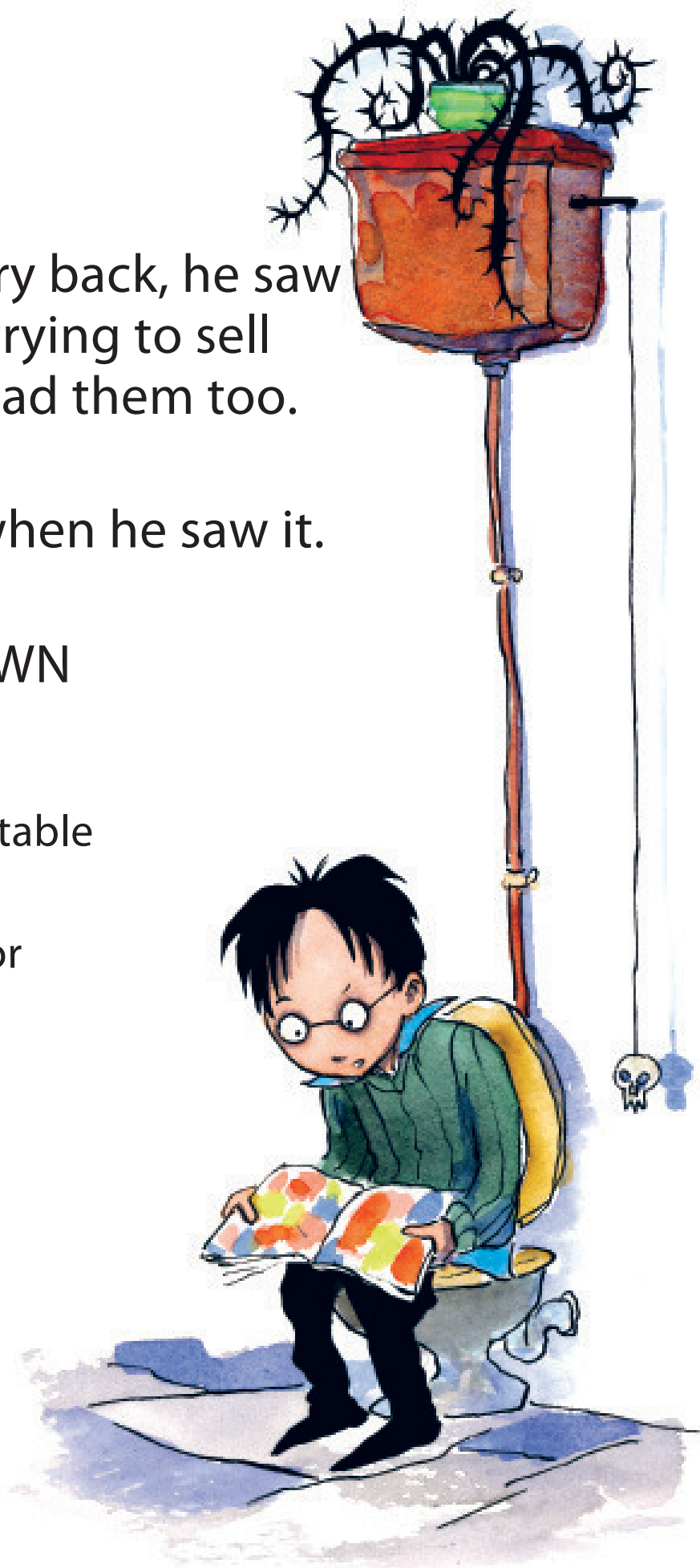


Then, at the very back, he saw some adverts, trying to sell things, so he read them too.

Cudweed asked his dad if he could have £5 to send away for the spaceship kit.

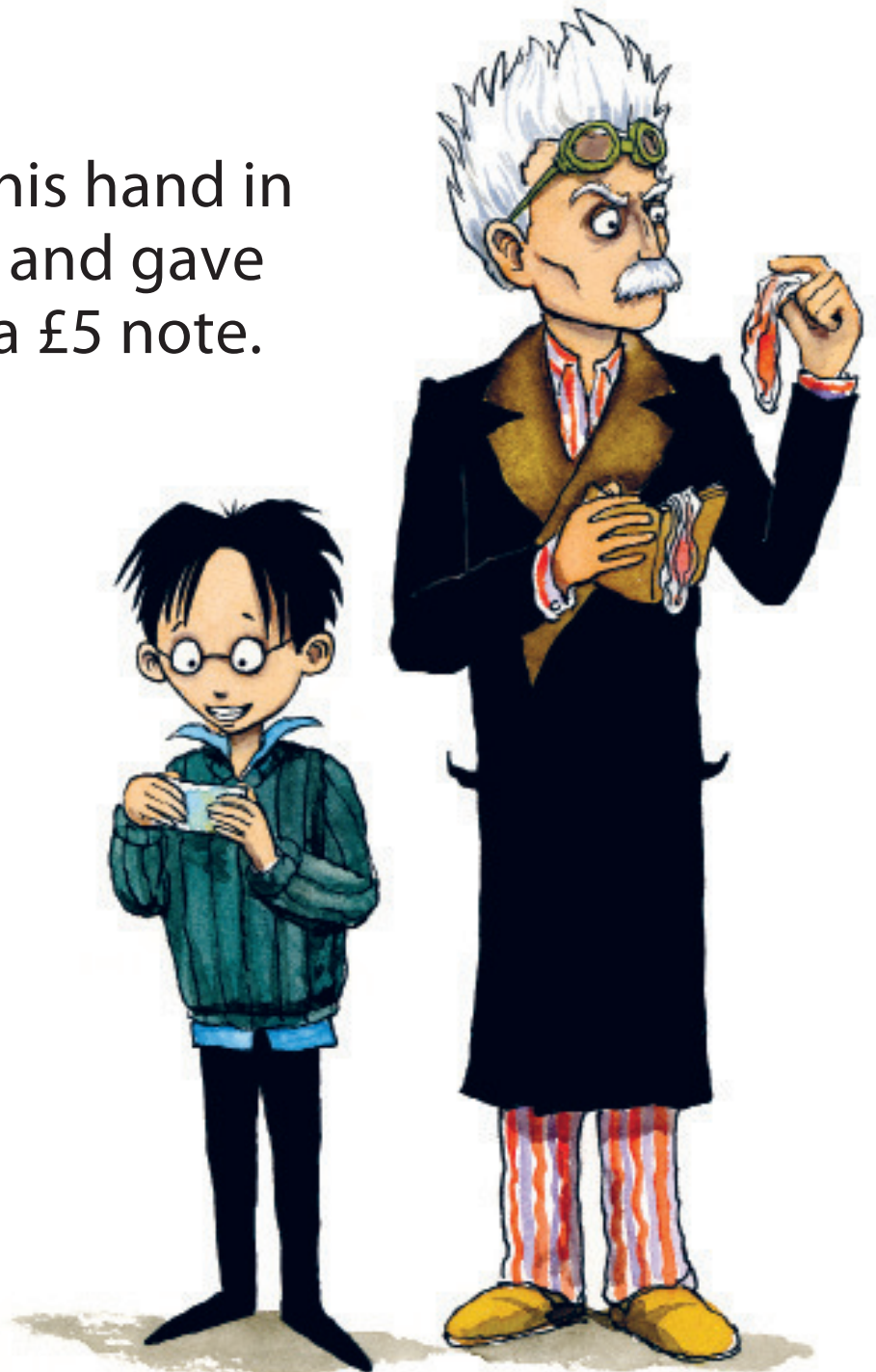
‘What’s that, my boy?’ said his dad.

'But, Dad, I just want to send off for this spaceship kit... It's just like Rocket Boy's.'

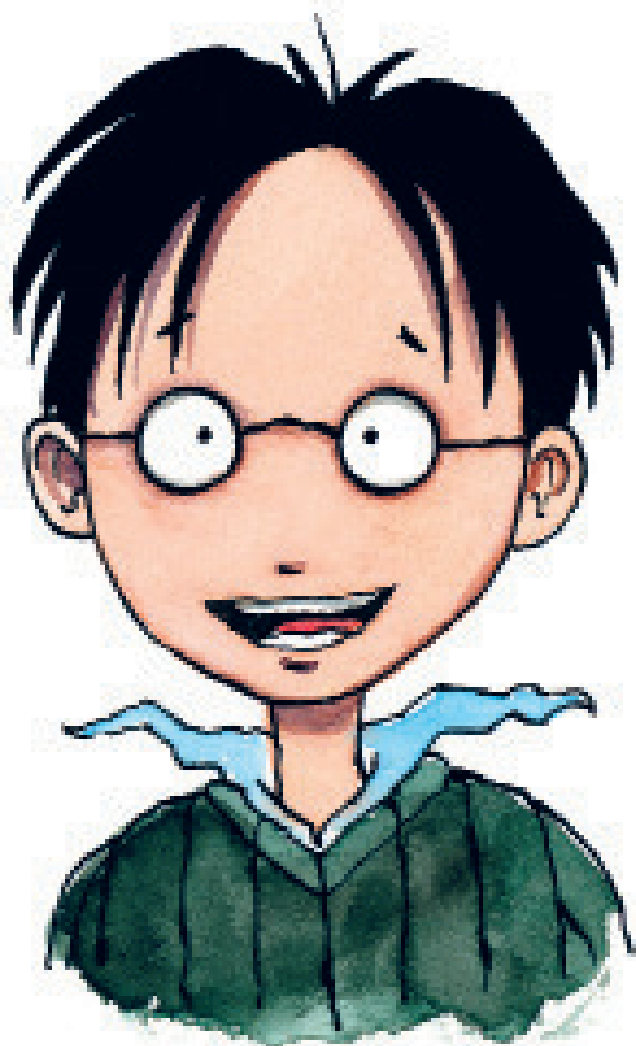
Cudweed's dad wasn't listening. Not properly.
