We tailed the professor as far as the library. Use track when someone follows the tracks that a person has left:

They brought in dogs to track the criminals.

Use startle, shock, or make someone jump if something frightens you suddenly:

Sam startled me when he jumped out from

behind a bush.

Use terrify if something frightens you a lot: That film used to terrify me when I was young.

Are you frightened of spiders?

terrified

petrified

Use startled if you are frightened by something sudden:

I was startled when the door suddenly opened.

Use terrified or petrified if you are very frightened:

James was petrified when he saw the lian.

frightening adjective

The film was quite frightening.

 terrifying Use terrifying for something that is very

frightening: It was terrifying going on such a big

roller coaster.
