PICASSO SELF PORTRAIT Picasso created weird and wonderful

portraits. Here's how to make your own!

1 On tracing paper, draw a face-on portrait of yourself in pencil. Trace over a photograph of yourself or use a mirror.

Tracing paper

Paintbrush

2 On another piece of tracing paper, draw another portrait of yourself at the same size- this time from a profile view.



3 Draw a third portrait of yourself on another ______ sheet of tracing paper at the same size- this time from a threequarter turned view.

Take all three of your portraits and layer them one on top of the other. Through the tracing paper, you should be able to see all three drawings. Line them up so your head is in the same place in each one.



Use acrylic paints to colour your portrait. The colours can be as strange as the portrait itself!



 On a piece of cartridge paper, redraw your lines, picking out the different features to make a 'muddled' portrait. Thicken the lines you want to stand out.

COLOUR WHEEL RUBBING

Decorate a picture frame with stamps you can make and change yourself!

Collect some leaves from your garden or local park. Make sure they are different sizes and have some interesting patterns and textures.

YOU WILL NEED:

- A variety of leaves
 Sheet of thin paper
- Coloured pencils
- · Watercolour paints
- Paintbrush

To make your final colour wheel, arrange six similar-sized leafs in a fanned circle. Run over these, in the colours of the colour wheel. These colours are: red, orange, yellow, green, blue and purple.

Using the watercolour paints and a paintbrush, practice blending out the six colours, so they go from bold to fait. Use more paint to make the colours bold and more water to make them fainer.

Finish your colour wheel by applying this painting technique around your leaf circle. Blend the different colours together when they meet to make new shades and tones.



2 Place your leaves under a sheet of thin paper, and practive making rubbing of them if different colours, using colouring pencils.
