The fish market was on the other side of the city from where the family was staying so they decided to take Tokyo's famously busy subway.

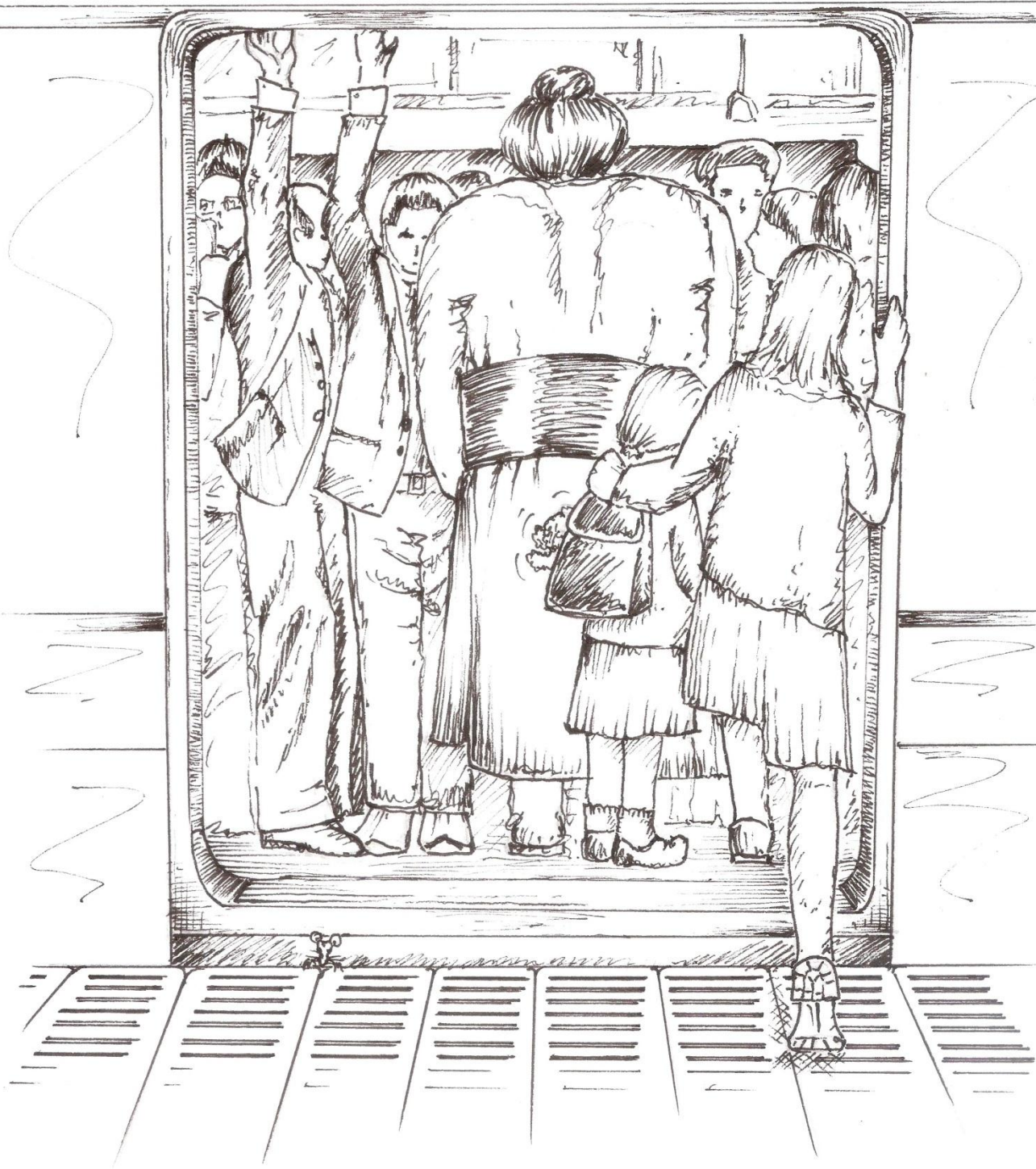

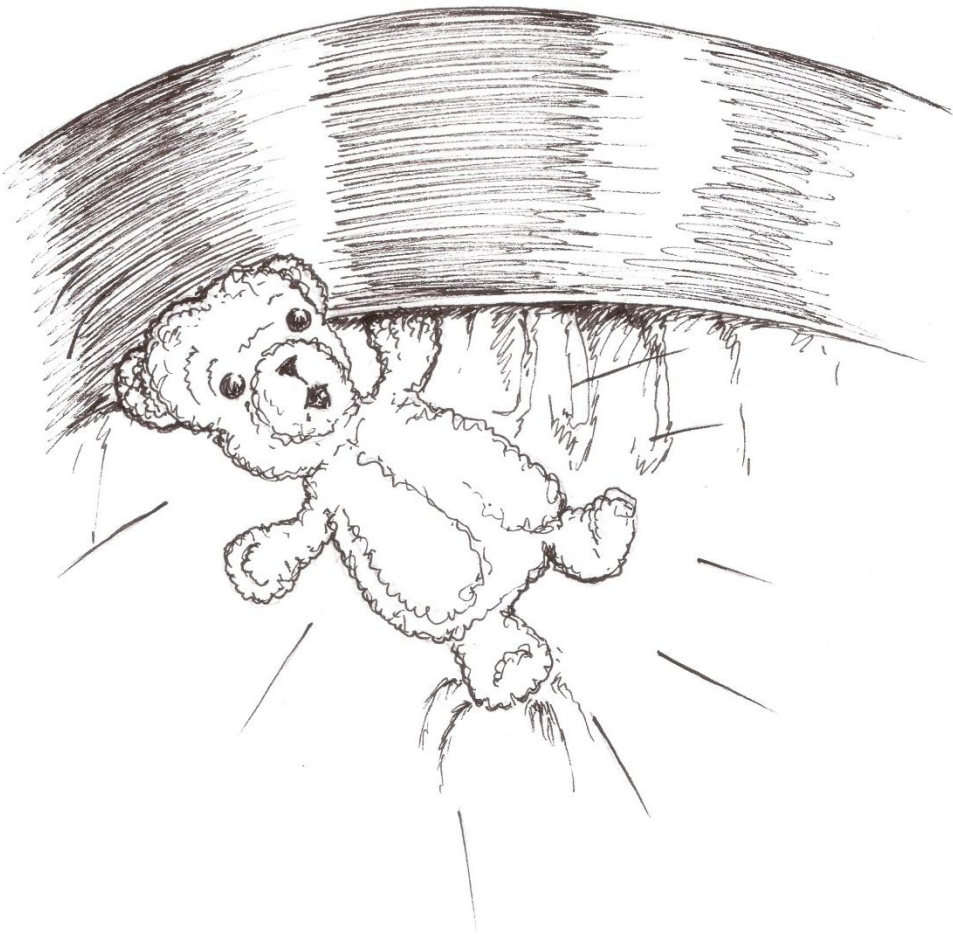
When the train arrived, the squeezing and shoving became crazy and the family was pushed forwards by the tide of people.
