THE HARMONICA

What's that wailing sound? It's John! He's on his way to Scotland to visit his cousin Stanley in Edinburgh, and he has been playing his battered old harmonica all the way from Liverpool. He's showing real talent; yet he's been blowing that harmonica for mile after mile and it's starting to drive some passengers crazy! But the driver likes it – he likes it so much that he promises to give John a much better harmonica when they get to Edinburgh.



The next morning, at the bus depot, the driver showed John a professional 'chromatic' harmonium that he'd found on a bus. It had never been claimed, so the kindly man gave it to John. Many years later, John's harmonium-playing helped to give The Beatles' first single, *Love Me Do*, its distinctive sound.

BUNK BEDS

In Hamburg, The Beatles are shocked to find their home is a walk-in store cupboard. When they open the door they don't see any furniture, just bunk beds. It's next door to the Ladies toilet. Yuck! With no bath or shower, they have to wash in the toilet sink. But John makes a good group leader; whenever his band gets down in the dumps, he encourages them by shouting, "Where are we going, boys?" And the others shout back, "To the toppermost of the poppermost, Johnny!"



At first John and Paul teased Stu for his haircut and for not wearing his leather rocker gear. But then one day, while on holiday together in Paris, John and Paul changed their hairstyles too. This was the haircut that they later made famous as the 'mop-top'. After a fall-out with the German club owner, The Beatles returned to Liverpool. But Stu decided to stay behind with Astrid and he left the band to study art.

GOODBYE PETE, HELLO RINGO

One day Brian meets a record producer called George Martin. George gives these Liverpool lads an audition and likes what he hears. At last they get a record deal! Meanwhile, The Beatles have taken Brian's advice and changed their image. They now wear suits – and John, Paul and George have mop-top haircuts! But things don't go well for Pete Best, and their old buddy Ringo replaces him on drums. Their first single, *Love Me Do*, shoots into the charts. After they record their next single, *Please Please Me*, George Martin says, "You've just recorded your first Number One, boys!" His prediction comes true.



The Beatles had already begun to feel that they didn't have much in common with Pete; his personality was different from theirs, he was quieter and he didn't always share their jokes. So despite Pete's popularity with the fans, when George Martin announced he wasn't happy with Pete's drumming on *The Beatles'* debut recordings, the band decided to fire him. When Brian Epstein broke the news, it was a terrible shock for Pete.

If there is anything you're not happy with, boys, just let me know.

Ringo was working in a holiday camp when he got the call. He happily swapped his Teddy Boy's quiff for a Beatle mop-top. At first Pete Best's fans chanted, "Pete forever, Ringo never!" One fan even gave George a black eye. But they soon accepted Ringo as a Beatle.

Well, I don't like your tie for a start!



More hits followed. On *The Beatles'* first LP, also called *Please Please Me*, they recorded their version of *Twist and Shout*. John had a sore throat which produced such a raspy sound that it is still considered the ultimate British Rock 'n' Roll vocal. Fans began to follow them everywhere, and the boys had to run to escape being torn into souvenir-sized pieces. When John married his girlfriend Cynthia, they tried to keep it a secret.



STRAWBERRY FIELDS FOREVER

This song is about the power of happy memories and favourite places.



John is happily remembering the grounds of a children's home called Strawberry Field. Paul took him to garden parties there.



He also used to sneak in and play there with his mates. In the song he says that when life gets hard he likes to imagine Strawberry Field.

ALL YOU NEED IS LOVE

After Sgt Pepper, The Beatles are invited to make the first ever live worldwide TV broadcast. They record *All You Need is Love*, a message of world peace and goodwill. John's fascination for the power of TV commercials and propaganda inspires a hypnotic chant of the word 'Love', while he sings to over 400 million global viewers that love is all that matters.

It has a huge impact on a world scarred by the war still raging in Vietnam and reaches Number One in many countries, topping their previous double single, *Penny Lane* and *Strawberry Fields Forever*.



In September, 1967, inspired by Paul's home-movie experiments, the band made a musical comedy, *Magical Mystery Tour*, about a brightly coloured wraith's coach trip. But in the UK, colour TV technology was so new that the film was first screened in black and white leaving many people bemused, it became their first critical failure. But it had some great new songs. In *I Am The Walrus* John mischievously wrote into the crazy lyrics a version of the old schoolboy rhyme about *turned and dead dogs' eyes*, as well as a radio extract from Shakespeare's *King Lear*.

THE 1960s

The Beatles' music became the soundtrack to the amazing things that happened during the remarkable decade that was the 1960s. Many of those changes still affect our lives today. Here are just a few of them...



John F. Kennedy is elected as president of the USA.

Tari Gagarin is the first man in outer-space. It is the start of the 'space race' between the USA and Soviet Union. President Kennedy promises the USA 'a man on the moon' by the end of the decade.

The first trans-atlantic satellite is broadcast by Telstar. The first ever computer video game is launched - 'Spacewar!'.

President Kennedy is assassinated in Dallas, Texas in November.

The first home video recording tape cassette are produced.



Civil rights protests continue across the USA, led by Martin Luther King.

American combat troops join the Vietnam War.



Fashion styles for young people continue to evolve as part of a growing worldwide 'youth culture'.

The first colour television are used in European homes.

The first successful heart transplant is carried out.

A youth movement begins that promotes peace and love. Wearing brightly coloured clothes they become known as 'hippies'. Many are Beatles fans.



Peace demonstrations continue against the Vietnam War and against the threat of nuclear war between the USA and the Soviet Union.



Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin make the first human moon landing from Apollo 11.

Arpanet, the first prototype of the Internet, is developed.



Despite peace demonstrations in many countries, the war in Vietnam still rages. It continues until 1975.
